

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An Open Local Forum – 9th September Community Conversation

We all value our health and know 'Our NHS' is one of the best health services in the world, but things are changing. Covid has been devastating, changing the way local surgeries (doctors and all health staff) look after patients – and privatisation is also having an impact.

On Thursday 9th September a group of us who had been litter picking in Horsley Woodhouse and Kilburn, met at the Legion to talk about what we'd hope for from Arthur Medical Centre as times change.

Although the GPs were not able to join us, Martin Allsopp, recently appointed chair of the Patients' Participation Group was there and made a very valuable contribution. Here's some of the ideas addressed to AMC from us as patients. We'd like:

- AMC to tell the community more about how it has been dealing with the pandemic and its
 plans for the future. More discussion/consultation between patients. Improved public
 relations.
- More flexibility of service provision: weekends, later evenings, in keeping with modern work patterns.
- A good balance between face to face and online/telephone consultations, as well as appointment making. Phone service needs to be improved. Face to face consultations are treasured.
- Clarity about what health issues can be discussed with Reception and what needs Clinical judgment.
- Recognise that as patients we need to understand what are realistic expectations and what are not.

Our little group are very supportive of AMC and the NHS and hope these ideas are of value.

Community Leadership Scheme

Councillors at Derbyshire County Council have extra funding available this year to help local groups in their area.

Each county councillor usually has £3,860 to give to local groups, but this year an additional £3,860 has been allocated bringing their total to £7,720. And next year councillors will receive £3,860, plus £1,500 Platinum Fund to give to local groups organising activities to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Groups seeking funding should contact me explaining the nature of the project, the amount sought, what other funding may be available, and how it will benefit the community.

Tackling Anti-Social behaviour funding

The Grant, worth a total £100,000, is designed to help local groups and organisations, including parish and town councils, to take a stand against the problems that bring misery to their communities. The funding is available in grants of up to £5,000.

The fund has been established to support projects that respond to issues already highlighted by local residents and will also provide vital help for initiatives designed to prevent problems from developing in the first place.

Applications are welcomed from innovative projects such as sports and creative arts diversionary programmes to drop-ins for young people, mentoring and parental support. Other projects could include better lighting, CCTV and community clean-ups. The Commissioner will also consider applications from organisations that offer some level of matched funding.

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"RAMBLING" Through Time

(A serialised alternative history of Horsley Woodhouse) Part 3. Top Dobholes to Bottom Dobholes

As we turn right from Stainsby Avenue we pass the Bus Shelter and then look to our right, we pause and see the brick built, double fronted Grand Moore Farm. A straight, paved path across lawns leads to the front door. Each side of the path is adorned with traditional cottage flowers making a glorious approach to this substantial dwelling. Adjacent is Grand Moore Cottage which nestles cosily behind its stone walls and hedges. Each spring a beautiful display of bright purple Aubretia tumbles from the front wall, chocolate box style. In contrast to this peaceful scene there is a distant memory of this property being struck by lightning a long time ago.

We then turn right and walk a few yards and we find a row of cottages known as Top Dobholes. As we face the cottages, there used to be a Nail Makers Hut on the right, (it has recently been demolished). There were several of these huts in the gardens of some of the older properties in the Village. They had a small furnace and a chimney and they formed part of the cottage industries. The men carried their bags of nails to sell in Nottingham. There was even a hostelry called the Bag O' Nails on the way. Let's hope the cost of the refreshment didn't exceed the profits.

Back onto to Church Lane again for another right-hand turn, past a huge old Ash tree which grows from the embankment on the right. A little further on and we arrive at a short access lane leading to a terrace of 5 houses running at right angles to the road. Each dwelling was built one step higher than the previous one


with the top of the terrace being almost level with the Sitwell Rec. This terraced row was known as Bottom Dobholes or Stepping Hill. Across the hard earth yard at the front was the row of coalhouses and lavatories. The coalhouses are self-explanatory, but the lavatories (also known as "Privvies") need a little further elaboration for readers who have only known the luxury of more modern facilities. An earth lavatory was housed in a small (usually) brick built shed with a latch door. To the rear of the inside of the shed a large oblong pit was dug to quite a depth with a hole to the rear, below the back wall for access to the waste and for ashes to be thrown into the pit. (You will notice on Geoff's illustration a bucket is the receptacle and not a hole in the rear of the "privvy", one would assume this was a more modern version). The seat was a substantial piece of wood placed over the hole and supported by a solid brick front with rear



and side supports. This seat had either just one aperture which accommodated all sizes (a one 'oler) or some had a second smaller hole (a two 'oler) which one would assume was safer for children to use without them accidentally plunging into the depths below. The seats were always thoroughly bleached and scrubbed smooth. Toilet rolls hadn't been heard of in those days and squares of newspaper were cut and pressed into vital service by threading string though one corner and suspending them in a bundle from a nail within easy reach of the occupant. A candle was a necessary companion on dark nights. The draught blowing through the rear must have been dreadful on a bitterly cold winter night, only to have been eclipsed by swarms of flies in

the summer. Not a venue to ever loiter in at any time of the year! These lavatories were emptied by the "night soil" men who had a cart with a wooden barrel with a piece of carpet thrown over the top. This onerous task was completed with the tipping of the barrel's contents at regular intervals over neighbouring fields. The locations of the deposits were later clearly marked by areas of lush dark green grass. The cart and barrel system was later replaced by a tanker wagon with a tap which could be operated for the more accurate and hygienic release of the contents.

The kitchen in a dwelling of this age was a multipurpose room for all the family, the focal point being a black leaded range. More often than not the ranges in these areas would be fuelled by the miners' concessionary coal. At one side was a boiler where water was ladled in and out to maintain the supply of hot water for all domestic eventualities. Amongst these included the weekly fireside bath for the whole family (the dirtiest one last!). The fire in the centre part had a large smoke hood which was adjusted according to the required "draw" of the fire (no thermostatically controlled appliances here!) and there would be a trivet for pans and a kettle at the front of the fire grate. On the other side there was an oven. These beautiful, gleaming, black leaded beasts are now a much sought after "must have" in traditionally restored homes. They were in their day the irreplaceable beating heart of a home. The washing was always done on a Monday with the dolly tub, ponch and mangle. The kitchen was transformed into something which closely resembled a sauna. Mother would be red faced and sweating with the huge amount of effort needed for this weekly chore. On blowy Mondays the washing was hung out to dry, but on wet wash days the sauna continued with assorted garments and bedding festooning the kitchen. (In later years after the introduction of an electricity supply, gradually most homes would have the luxury of





A pantry was a necessity with a stone thrall to keep food cool and shelves heaving under the weight of home- made jams, pickles, chutneys, bottled fruit and salted beans to last for the winter months. Cheese, bacon, butter, cold meat etc., were stored in a Meat Safe with mesh sides for good air circulation. Bacon and cheese were wrapped in greaseproof paper and if the cheese grew a mould.....it was fine, just cut it off! Bread, cakes, biscuits and pies were all skilfully baked on the range and dinners were cooked in an assortment of heavy pans on the trivet. Times were hard. Hens and a pig were often kept in the back garden for eggs and meat. The pig was killed

when ready, hung up and bled for black puddings, the fat was rendered into lard and the offal was eaten first for obvious reasons. Bacon and ham were cured and hung as flitches on hooks in the pantry, trotters were boiled and served as a dinner and the cooking juices formed the jelly to be used in pork pies. Heads were boiled, stripped, seasoned and pressed into brawn for cold savoury cuts. In fact the old saying was, "all the pig was used apart from the squeal"! All food was respected, nothing was wasted and sell by dates were not needed. A good rotation, a keen nose and good cooking and preparation skills were all the safety measures necessary. Most of the produce used was home grown, imagine the skills and the hive of industry at harvest time, preparing and preserving food with taste and quality without E numbers and the bewildering chemistry of additives found in a lot of our modern over packaged foods. The fare was

seasonal, wholesome and good, thanks to recipes, traditions and skills handed down through generations and now regretfully lost to the past along with the art of ale and wine brewing.

The bedrooms were exactly what it said on the label in the old days. They were cold in the winter and not at all hospitable until snuggled under eiderdowns and blankets with a Denby or Langley hot water bottle or an oven shelf warmed and

wrapped in a towel to take the chill off the bed. The bedrooms in warmer weather were certainly not a place of escape "to do your own thing" the place to be was downstairs in the hub of the family, unless of course you were ill and bed rest was ordered by the Doctor. A quaint but very necessary item in every bedroom to be found in antique shops nowadays was a "Po" or "Guzunder" with often an eye painted in the bottom. A survivor of Victorian humour and the culprit behind a lot of unexplained rusty bedsprings! The more flowery elaborate ones are desirable jardinières for modern day conservatories.



I mentioned the Nail Makers earlier and this seems a good opportunity to include the other

main cottage industry which took place in the Village. This was called Chevening. Socks were knitted and collected from Village properties which housed a Stocking Frame. The ladies worked very fine stitching on the sides of the socks which was in the shape of a chevron motif. This work was done in the evening when the day's work was finished. In order to see the fine needlework a candle or lamp was placed behind a glass container filled with water. This was angled so that a concentrated patch of light shone onto the work. The Chevoning was very poorly paid with only a few pence being earned for a dozen pairs of socks. It must have been a tiring and monotonous task. A stark contrast to today's huge choice of home entertainment!

I have covered some of the finer details of typical life up Stepping Hill because it seems an appropriate early opportunity to create a mental picture of the home life of many of the inhabitants of the Village as our ramble continues next time.
