Remembering days gone by – a villages effort to support WW2

September 3rd 1939 Great Britain was at war with Nazi Germany. Rolls Royce had made the decision to concentrate all its efforts at the Derby works on Merlin engine production. One of the problems was what to do about crashed engines, being returned to Derby from around the UK, and Europe. Belper and district was selected for the evacuation of nonmanufacturing personnel and suitable sites were requisitioned by the Ministry for a variety of tasks; including salvaging parts from these engines and work on the Meteor tank engine (85 per cent of Merlin parts were common to the new tank engine, which at this stage was still on the drawing board). The sites in Horsley Woodhouse which had been selected were North's Bus Garage (where Ken Slack's house now stands). The old Trent Bus Garage site where the Mews is built, Cadman's Yard now the site of the Royal British Legion, Marshall's Timber Yard now B.A. Kelf's Body Works and for storing engines Booth's orchard which fronted what is now Fairfield Road. Wigley's of Belper had been given the contract to take on the engine dismantling. Initially Merlin engines were brought to the village to be dismantled for scrap, after a short time this became a salvage operation. This involved cleaning and inspecting the salvaged parts, these were then sent out for the production of the new Meteor tank engine. Parts not suitable for tank engines were sent for aero engine repair.

So in 1940 the initial workforce of one man and three lads commenced dismantling engines in North's Garage at the rate of 3 to 5 per week. They worked in very basic conditions, a cold water tap without a sink in one corner accessible over a pile of crashed Merlin parts, no serviceable toilet, no heating system, no mashing facilities and very dicey electrics. As time went on a few more men joined the payroll, eventually Marshall's Timber Yard was converted into a cleaning shop and inspection area. 50 local ladies were recruited to work on this, working two shifts a day (6 till 2 then 2 till 10 pm) this had an effect on the village economy, for the first time in many cases these ladies had disposable income in their pockets and local businesses benefitted.

Parts from the Bowmer and Kirkland site at Heage were coming to Woodhouse for cleaning and inspection and the demand from Belper, for parts for the new Meteor tank engine, plus bits to repair existing engines began to build. The dismantling sites at North's Garage, Cadman's Yard and the old Trent Garage were manned and busy stripping engines down. Lorries were arriving in the village from all over the UK. The problem was where to put the engines they carried, and one day I witnessed this as an 11 year old school boy. Lorries were standing from the Flower Shop up to the Old Oak Inn waiting to be unloaded, drivers impatient and wanting to get away to destinations as far afield as Glasgow, Manchester and the South Coast. Mr Wigley was sent for and he negotiated with the owners and Booth's orchard was made available. The lorries were driven in through a gap

torn in the fence, the engines rolled off onto the grass, they were bolted onto jigs in the crates so suffered no damage. Remember at this stage the workforce had no crane or lifting tackle and had to improvise as each situation arose.

By the end of 1942 the operation from engines arriving in the village to the end product of parts for the Meteor tank engine or for repairing existing engines was running smoothly thanks largely to the overseeing of Ron Harrison who still had to get his bike out at times to keep things moving. However, pressure was about to build on the Horsley Woodhouse war effort, in America Packard Merlins were in production but the increase in engine input was to come when R.A.F Bomber Command began to receive its 4-engined heavies (Stirling Halifax and Lancaster) aircraft.

Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

Low temperatures and heavy rain have had a significant impact upon our roads. In 2017, we had reduced the backlog of potholes by 80%. However, due to the exceptionally bad weather, we have seen the number of potholes listed for repair in a week rise from 120 in December to 2,000 in March. We are, therefore, spending an extra £1m to address this, on top of the £2m already allocated. The Government has added a further £1m, so we are now spending double the amount from the previous 12 months. We also have nine additional gangs of road workers to support our usual team of 12.

The Teams have managed to repair 7,943 potholes so far, this year, compared to 5,355 last year. So, they are working hard to try and get on top of things. However, it is worth noting that if you lay tarmac in low temperatures it is likely to crumble and will quickly need doing again. This is inefficient and just leads to further complaints. The Council try and fix potholes within a couple of days, but this can extend from anything between five and 28 days, dependent upon severity and workload. I am conscious we need to keep on top of things, so please use the Derbyshire County

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Council's website to report any

road defects under the 'Transport Section' as it makes the process more efficient <u>www.derbyshire.gov.uk</u>.

Anyone wishing to take advantage of learning a new language, improve their Maths, English, IT skills, or wish to gain professional qualifications in bricklaying, plastering etc., can sign up to our Adult Community Education Service. The summer term starts on Monday 9th April and includes free courses to help get people back into work, with CV writing, job applications and interview skills. There is advice on starting your own business and a range of trainee apprenticeships. You can enrol online or call 01629 533 190.

The Public-Sector reform agenda rumbles on. Combined Authorities and Devolution of powers to local regions has certainly stalled in the East Midlands. Getting 19 Local Authorities to be in agreement was always going to be a herculean task. The Derby & Nottingham Metro Strategy aimed at bringing the two Cities together has not attracted much traction so far. I am hardly surprised at that, because the final document included enveloping Amber Valley, together with six other Local Authorities. Proposing to do that, without speaking first

to the Local Authorities concerned is never a good tactic in my book! It certainly does not win you many friends.

I fully recognise that Public-Sector reform can achieve significant savings, reduce duplication and bureaucracy. It is also easier for Governments to deal with one accountable body, as against numerous. Finding the right model will be a challenge, but Councils will need to come together and work together to find a solution that works for this region. Otherwise, we will lose out on both finances and opportunities.

The Secretary of State has appointed an independent Planning Inspector, Karen Baker, to conduct an examination of Amber Valley's Local Plan. I anticipate that this will take place in June.

The Cubs started working towards their DIY badge. They made a start on some napkin holders, which we hope to use at Group events. They also learnt about different tools and how to use them safely.



looked at the footage the following week, and all spoke well. We hope they gained some valuable confidence and experience.





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"Shonkcum" – local mining history

With thanks to Laura Booth and 'Picture The Past' for permission to use one of the images These two photographs are believed to be of the coal working known by locals as "Shonkcum", the name coming from the "pinkish" coloured flowering weeds growing formerly in abundance thereabouts. Records show that the more formal name may have been "Hill Top":

"Hill Top Adit, Horsley Woodhouse, (Thomas Jordan Esq) Kilburn best coal 2' 4" (0.71m), seconds 1' 1" (0.39m), flush 7" (0.18m), inferior coal 1' 1" (0.39m), Sep 1928, Surveyor George K Barrow (365)".

Note. Thomas Jordan was a noted Horsley Woodhouse local of the times and what we would now call an "entrepreneur" – merchant, builder, land and

Located opposite the Sitwell Arms Pub in the fields adjacent to Wood Lane, Shonkcum was a Footrill (or Adit, hence the name above), basically names for a drift type mine working that slopes down from the surface to a seam of coal. It appears that Shonkcum was worked commercially during a period starting perhaps prior to, or just after the First World War, up to 1929 and "turned" some fairly good quality coal in its time, evidenced, to some extent, by the fair sized lumps seen in one of the photographs. The photographs look south from the footrill to the brook course (Park Brook), running approximately parallel to Smalley Mill Road. It is

thought that the extracted coal was taken across the fields and loaded at this road.

It is understood that the workers experienced difficulties with "gas", basically methane and carbon dioxide, the former often called "black or firedamp" and at some point was the scene of a rescue, one of the miners bringing a colleague (or colleagues) to safety, an act for which he was awarded a medal for bravery.

If the Hill Top name is correct, records show that, by the late 1920's, the working was no longer viable:

"Hill Top (Thomas Jordan) Horsley Woodhouse, Kilburn, Derbyshire, unprofitable, 8 Jun 1929, met old hollows and coal worked from neighbouring old Kilbourne".

Again, if the same workings, this meant permanent closure of the Shonkcum footrill; only surface traces remain visible today.

Some of this account is anecdotal and I would be interested to know if anyone could confirm the main points or provide additional information on this piece of local mining history.


