The first plane, flown by Squadron Leader Andy 'Milli' Millican, just after the parade reached the arena, was especially emotive as it is the oldest airworthy Spitfire in the world and the only one still flying which took part in the Battle of Britain. The second plane, which came over the following hour was a later variant and was flown by Squadron Leader Mark 'Disco' Discombe. Both pilots completed three passes and flew so low that you could see them waving and gave the classic 'wing waggle' salute as they left the village. ### 'We Will Remember Them'

### Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen with known graves: Lance Corporal Charles Edward Canner, 2nd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, WW1

Charles was born in 1888 in Long Eaton, Derbyshire, his parents were William and Emma Canner. The 1891 Census shows that, at this time, he had two older sisters, Alice M Canner (8 years old) and Florence L Canner (6 years old), one older brother, Joseph W Canner (4 years old) and a younger brother Thomas H Canner who was just 1 year old in 1891. Alice, the oldest, was born in Ilkeston in 1883, but, the census records for 1891 and 1911 show the family to be living in Ashby-de-la-Zouch, Leicestershire. Charles' connection with Horsley Woodhouse is not completely clear, marriage records for the Belper, Derbyshire vicinity, show that a Charles Edward Canner married Eleanor Wood in early 1915, if this is the same Charles E Canner, then perhaps he was (or possibly the couple were), resident in Horsley Woodhouse at some point, although it must be noted that I have not been able to confirm either the marriage or residency at the time of writing.

Records show that Charles served with the 2nd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry (K.O.Y.L.I) during World War One and that he enlisted at Eastwood, the latter providing further indication that he was resident in the locality. Originally part of 13th Brigade in 5th Division, the battalion was in Britain at the onset of war with Germany in August 1914 and deployed straight to the Western Front of France and Belgium, landing at Le Havre on the 16th August that year and remaining on the front for the remainder of the war. The battalion saw action at the Battle of Mons, the Battle of Le Cateau, the Battles of the Marne and Aisne and the First Battle of Ypres, all in 1914. In 1915, they were transferred to 97th Brigade in 32nd Division to strengthen this inexperienced volunteer division. They saw action around Ypres, including the fighting at Hill 60. In the latter part of 1916, they were involved with the Battles of the Somme. In 1917 they were in action on the Ancre (Somme region), at Arras and during the pursuit of the Germans following their withdrawal to the Hindenburg Line in February and March, before fighting in the major British offensive of Third Ypres (Passchendaele). I do not have details as to when Charles joined the army but he may have been involved with some of these actions. He was certainly on the Western Front in 1918.

As 1918 arrived, the Germans knew they would have to attack early, on some scale, in order to win the war. America had joined the conflict and her troops would soon begin to arrive on the Western Front in numbers. The time was right for the Germans, Russia had collapsed in 1917 and this meant, amongst other things, that 500,000 German soldiers could be released from the Eastern Front and made available in the West. General Ludendorff (now in command of the German Army together with Paul Hindenburg), ordered a major offensive to be launched in France, in the spring, from the Hindenburg Line. The focus of this attack was to be the sector around St Quentin, against the British Third and Fifth Armies. To assist with the initial breakthrough of the British lines, the German artillery were to be used in a manner referred to as the Feuerwaltze, a system devised by a senior officer, Lieutenant Colonel Georg Bruchmuller. Basically this was an effective and economical bombardment carried out in three phases, 1)

a brief concentration on British command and communication HQ's and telephone installations; 2) heavy bombardment of British artillery positions; 3) a pounding of British front-line infantry defences. The whole scheme was relatively short, but intense, bringing into play the large numbers of heavy artillery pieces and ammunition now available to the Germans.

The overall German plan was actually split into four attacks using the respective codenames of "Michael", Georgette, Gneisenau and Blucher-Yorck. Michael was to be the main effort, its objectives being to break the Allied lines, outflank the British forces holding the front from Picardy to the English Channel and, as a consequence, bring about the defeat of the British in France. The collective attack was known to the Germans as the Kaiserlacht (Kaiser's Blow or Battle). Operation Michael opened with a major attack on the British Fifth Army and the right wing of Third Army on the 21st March 1918, the offensive started with Bruchmuller's phased bombardment, during which approximately one million shells were fired at the British in a period of just 5 hours, hitting targets in a 150 square mile area. The artillery barrage was followed by an infantry assault, using elite German "Stormtroopers". Here luck smiled on the German forces, the morning of the 21st had dawned foggy, giving the stormtroopers extra cover and enabling them to penetrate deep into the British positions. By the end of the first day, British casualties totalled almost 39,000, killed, wounded or missing. The Germans had broken through the British lines at several points in the Fifth Army sector and along the Cambrai-Bapaume road, near Bullecourt in Third Army area. The German attack continued and after two days, Fifth Army was in retreat, causing a separation with Third Army and exposing its right wing to a point where this Army had to fall back to avoid being outflanked. German gains were so great that the Kaiser pronounced the 24th March 1918 as a National Holiday; victory seemed in sight. It was not to be, in their relentless "plunge" forward, German troops had carried almost nothing, except weapons, to ensure speed of movement. As they pushed on over the old battlegrounds, their supply lines simply could not keep up; the stormtroops at the front of the attack failed to receive vital supplies, including food. The German advance on Amiens had proceeded via the town of Albert, once the main British centre on the Somme. In Albert German soldiers found shops stocked with food, supplies and drink (this scenario also occurred elsewhere). They were hungry, exhausted and desperate, looting started, discipline collapsed and the great German offensive "staggered" and gradually came to a halt; Amiens was not taken.

Despite having achieved the largest breakthrough on the Western Front for some 3 years, the German Army had driven itself "into the ground", sustaining around 230,000 casualties. The Allies were not defeated. The tide turned, with 250,000 American troops reaching the front by the end of March 1918. In the period mid-July to 11th November, in a series of actions referred to as the "100 Days", the Allies counter-attacked in force, pushing the Germans back and inflicting huge losses. In one of the closing actions of the war, Canadian troops entered and liberated Mons, where it had all started for the British in 1914.

Lance Corporal Charles Edward Canner is listed as "died of wounds received" on the 29th March 1918, he is buried in Doullens Communal Cemetery, Extension No.1, Plot 5, row C, Grave No. 24, Doullens, France.

It seems most likely that Charles was mortally wounded in the days following the opening of the "Michael" attack. 32nd Division appear to have been part of British Fourth Army, commanded by General Rawlinson at this time. Doullens lies approximately 18 miles north of Amiens and it is known that 2nd Battalion K.O.Y.L.I. fought in the Amiens vicinity in 1918. At the time of writing I do not have details of the circumstances of Charles Canner's death,


although artillery fire and German offensive action remain the more likely causes.

The town of Doullens is located in the Department of the Somme, north of Amiens on the N25 road to Arras. The Communal Cemetery and its two Extensions are sited to the east of the town, a short distance S.E. of the Arras road. The British/Commonwealth Casualty Clearing Station was located in Doullens in March 1916 and 41st, 35th and 11th followed. By late 1916, the 3rd Canadian Stationary Hospital was established (staying up to June 1918) as was the 2/1st Northumbrian Casualty Clearing Station. These medical units used the Doullens Communal Cemetery Extension No.1 for burials. A second extension was started in the spring of 1918.

### **Stone Seat**

Villagers have been wondering what is happening near the millennium wall. Who is Thomas Seal? and where was the Primitive Methodist Chapel?

In the village there used to be a row of six cottages called Club Row. These were built by Thomas Seal for the Horsley Woodhouse Male Friendly Society. Before the welfare



state, friendly societies provided financial and social services to individuals.

The Primitive Methodist Chapel was known as the Bethel Chapel. Both these buildings stood opposite the Church Hall. In 1974 the Chapel had closed, the cottages had been condemned and they were demolished to make way for the entrance to Fairfield Road.



At the time the date stones were saved with the idea of incorporating them into a seat near the site. These stones have languished in various places over this time. With the importance of recording village history for future generations, it was thought necessary to continue this project before the stones were lost for good.

The millennium wall site was chosen as it was thought more suitable for this, and some stone still left from the rebuilding of the church hall was to be used. A history interpretation board about the buildings and other buildings in the village is to be included in the project.

When digging the foundations for the seat a tiled floor was uncovered from the house that had stood on this site. It was in remarkably good condition and it was possible to make out where the fire place had been.



### **County Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated**

Amber Valley Borough Council Planning Board approved the planning application to build a Co-op Store on the site of The Club on Main Street, Planning Reference AVA/2016/0210. Full details are available on the Council's website.

A number of residents who installed flexible highway sign markers to prevent vehicles damaging grass verges have been told to remove them by the County Council's Highways Department. I have asked the Council to consider approving a type of Highway marker that both residents and Parish Council's can install, which not only protects grass verges but also enhances road safety.

Following an additional allocation of £1.06 million worth of Government funding in June, to address pothole repairs, I have requested the use of the 'jetpatcher' on our roads which takes 15 minutes, but should ensure potholes are permanently fixed.

I recently attended a briefing on the HS2 project and Midlands Connect, which is about developing a Strategic Transport Strategy. It is good to have new shiny fast trains that will increase capacity, contribute to economic development and create in the region of 3.6 million jobs. But we also need to consider the benefit to local communities and improve infrastructure, as we are less than 13 miles away from the Hub Station. As well as improved access to Nottingham, Derby and East Midlands Airport, I am also looking at transport links to local villages. Access to the proposed Hub at Toton needs to be improved. Plus HS2 should not be looked at in isolation and be to the detriment of other forms of public transport at a time when we should be addressing traffic congestion.

#### **Report from June and July Parish Council meetings**

#### June:

- The Parish Council are looking to join the Speed Watch Group which will enable the Council to work with the Police to try and reduce the speed of vehicles travelling through the village.
- The Council members are concerned about the amount of litter in the village, and are considering employing someone to carry out litter picking duties.
- The Council would like to erect a flag pole in the village and are considering locations for this to be sited.
- The members are looking into providing a defibrillator for the village.

#### July:

- The Parish Council are looking at organising a Speed Watch Scheme to run in the village to try to kerb the excessive speed of vehicles travelling through the village. However, a number of volunteers are required for this to be able to move forward, therefore if anyone is interested in becoming involved in the Speed Watch initiative and have some time to spare for training and carrying out the speed checks please contact a member of the parish council or email <u>horsleywoodhouseparishcouncil@aol.com</u>.
- Cllr Buttery reported that two companies are involved with the repair to the speeding sign and will be repaired shortly.
- The damaged bus shelter on Church Lane has been reported to Amber Valley, as it is their responsibility for the upkeep of this shelter.
- A flagpole for the village is to be purchased and erected in the Church yard.
- Strimming verges in the village will be carried in the next few weeks.

#### Recreation Matters (July):

The Parish Council will be requesting a police presence in the village as there has been a number of incidents in the village recently including vandalism of the Scout Hut on the Sitwell Recreation Ground.


#### Scouts have been busy again!
