Personally, my memory of the day, was the church bells ringing out around 9.00 pm for the first time in six years, prior to that they would only be rung if Nazi paratroopers were landing; what the public were supposed to do no-one ever told us.

Horsley Woodhouse R.B.L would like to congratulate whoever was responsible for naming the stretch of road from Church Lane corner to Kelf's garage "Merlin Lane". Along this lane large quantities of Merlin engine parts were moved in and out; inwards to the inspection department set up on the site and outwards for those suitable to the Clan Foundry site at Belper where Rolls-Royce were developing a new tank engine for the British Army.

The name helps to perpetuate the memory of those men and women who worked long and tiring hours in all weathers to see us through to ultimate victory.

New name for Church Lane

As mentioned in the Parish Council report in the last Wudhus News, Amber Valley Borough Council (AVBC) have now organised a new street name and postcode for the road leading off Church Lane giving access to seven private dwellings, B A Kelf Bodyworks and the Sitwell Recreation Ground, including the Scout Headquarters. This was done because these properties have been difficult to locate by visitors or delivery vans and more importantly by the emergency services.

After consulting with residents, and considering a number of different suggestions, AVBC decided

on the name Merlin Lane. The reason for this is that, as many readers will know, during the Second World War several premises and areas of land in the village were brought into use as workshops for the dismantling, salvage and inspection of parts of Rolls Royce Merlin aero engines which had either been recovered from crashed aircraft or removed because they had served their limit in operating hours. A great number of these engines were brought to Horsley Woodhouse from all over the country during the war years and for a short time afterwards.

One of the premises taken over for this purpose was what is now the land and buildings occupied by B A Kelf Bodyworks, which is one of the properties on the road which is the subject of this matter.

Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

There is no doubt that the Coronavirus Pandemic will have an impact upon each and every one of us in some way or another. Whether as a result of the virus itself, or due to restrictions on travel and holidays abroad, socialising with others, panic buying of toilet rolls and foodstuffs or a downturn in the economy which will affect both national and local businesses. We, are in unprecedented and worrying times, being bombarded with advice and opinions on how to keep safe, coming from all directions.

Derbyshire County Council works closely with the NHS and others in an attempt to ensure you are kept well informed. It's website

www.derbyshire.gov.uk is regularly updated in an effort to highlight the whereabouts of cases in Derbyshire as well as the symptoms and prevention measures that can be taken. Advice is provided for schools and parents, emotional health and wellbeing and information on the role of Public Health.

The Government has outlined its commitment to supporting councils to focus their efforts on

information.

the priority areas of social care, providing vital support for vulnerable people and supporting local economies.

To enable councils to focus on delivering front line services, both the local council elections together with the election of the Police & Crime Commissioner have been postponed for 12 months. Financial audits have been deferred until the 30th September and new legislation is being considered to allow the holding of 'virtual' council committee meetings for a temporary period, in an effort to avoid face to face meetings.

I welcome the Chancellor's commitment to provide financial support of £12 billion to support public services, individuals and businesses through the economic disruption of Covid-19. Only time will tell as to whether this will be enough, as the situation is changing on a daily basis.

Help for businesses include an increase in the business rates retail discount to 100% for one year, which has been expanded to include the leisure and hospitality sectors, and increased the planned rates discount for pubs to £5,000. An estimated 900,000 properties, or 45% will receive 100% business rate relief in 2020 to

2021.

A new temporary Coronavirus
Business Interruption Loan
Scheme, delivered by the British
Business Bank, should be launched
in a matter of weeks.

Derbyshire County Council has also set up a Covid-19 Community Response Unit to bring agencies and volunteers together. The Unit will be led by public health and emergency planning officers. The Council has also agreed an initial £1m coronavirus fund to help support vulnerable residents and affected businesses.

This is a time we all need to pull together to keep everyone as safe and protected as possible. I have no doubt over the coming weeks agencies, as well as the Council will be looking for volunteers to assist in helping our most vulnerable residents and supporting vital services. So please keep checking www.derbyshire.gov.uk for the latest updates. Be sensible, follow guidelines and keep safe.


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"Missing"

Two Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen, Two World Wars Part Four – The RAF Bomber Offensive, WW2, 101 Squadron, Ludford Magna:

After a break, ops are on at Ludford. Tuesday, 31st August 1943, Cecil Bardill, Flight Engineer from the Derbyshire village of Horsley Woodhouse, sees his crew listed on the Battle Order for the night, down to fly Lancaster JB150, SR-S – "S for Sugar". The airfield

comes alive again. Cecil and the other crew follow the routine of aircraft and personal equipment checks, word goes around, maximum fuel and bomb loads suggesting a long haul. Lunch forced down past the "knot and flitting butterflies" then dozing off in the billet to the sound of Merlins being tested. Then hanging around in the Mess until someone shouts "C-Flight transport's here". Bert Edis (pilot) and Norm Corfield (Navigator) go in to the primary briefing – the curtain is drawn back, "tonight's target is......Berlin",



Flight plan for the Berlin raid of 31st Aug./1st Sept. 1943 groans and mutterings - the "Big City", long trip, well defended target, Norm takes notes, flight times, course changes, scheduled time for bombing. Norm isn't keen, the course chosen means that they will have to fly 70 miles beyond Berlin, then turn and attack from the SE; the withdrawal route is long. Cecil and the others go in – it's going to be tough. Time crawls by, at last it's time to "kit up" – Cecil makes sure that his gear is OK and comfortable.

Outside to the transports and off to dispersals, "good luck" and "see you" shouts as crews drop of at their aircraft, finally Cecil and co. arrive at "Sugar". Ground crew confirm that their Lanc. is OK, Edis and Cecil still do checks – some of the

"lads" pee on the tail wheel for luck. Edis signs the 700 form to accept the aircraft and the crew clamber aboard. Edis buckles in, Cecil

settles beside him. Helmets on, the crew all plug in to the intercom and oxygen.

19.40 hrs., Edis checks with his crew — "pilot to rear gunner, OK?" — "OK Skip", "mid-upper — OK?" — "OK Skip", each man in turn. 2 minutes to start up, "OK Cecil?" — "OK Skip, ready to start" — Edis: "ground /flight switch to ground", ground crew plug in the Trolley Acc. — Edis and Cecil go through their checks — "engine controls set, fuel OK Skip". Edis signals to the ground crew, then "starting starboard inner" — Cecil watches as the prop. turns slowly then the Merlin catches bursting into life, blurring the blades; the routine is repeated until all four are running. "Ground/flight switch to flight", Edis runs the engines up to 1200 revs to warm them, Cecil checks temperatures and pressures, "all OK" — Edis checks turret movements with the gunners — "OK Skip" — "wireless operator? — all OK Skip", "compass and Gee OK Norm? — "OK Skip".

Butterflies gone now, the crew are working as a unit; Edis pushes the revs to 1500, Cecil checks the "mags", superchargers, constant speed units — engines all OK. Edis throttles back, light beginning to fade, other Lancs. are rolling along the peri-track. Then "Sugar's" turn — Edis gets the "thumbs-up" from the ground crew, he motions chocks away and gets a good luck wave in return. "Sugar" joins the queue for take-off. Glancing out of the cockpit, Cecil sees a group of "well-wishers" near the signals hut. Edis rolls "Sugar" to the hold position on the runway threshold — straight, lined up, brakes on; sun well down now.

20.15 hrs., green light from the signals hut, SR-S clear for take-off. "OK chaps, here we go", Edis has his left hand on the control column, feet on the rudder pedals, right hand on the four throttle levers, he eases them forward favouring the two port engines to counter swing. "Sugar" picks up speed, Edis holds her straight, Cecil is standing now, checking the gauges as Edis moves the column gently forward; the tail wheel comes up, he uses the rudders to keep "Sugar" on track. Cecil takes over the throttle levers, pushing forward – "full power Skip", Edis clamps both hands on the control column - Cecil calls the speed: "100, 110, 120 mph, crucial moments, "Sugar" fully laden, 2000 gallons of fuel, 6 tons of bombs, 7 crew, all-up weight close to 25 tons.....130 mph, Edis hauls back on the control column, wheels "un-glue" – end of the runway coming up, "undercart up" – Cecil confirms, hedges slide beneath, S-Sugar airborne, underway, bound for the "Big City" - flaps to 10 degrees, Norm gives the heading for Mablethorpe - "OK Skip, ETA Mablethorpe good". Edis keeps "Sugar" climbing. In what seems like no time, Ron Holdaway calls "Mablethorpe coming up Skip" and Norm gives the necessary course change. Darker now, "Sugar" slips into the bomber stream – Edis lets the gunners test their guns. "Navigator to pilot, ETA good for Dutch coast", "pilot to engineer, engines seem alright Cecil, how's the fuel?" – "OK so far Skip, "Pilot to navigator, are we still on course?" – "course good Skip, 'Gee' confirms, signals all good". "Pilot to gunners, enemy coast coming up, keep your eyes open for fighters"...

To this point my account has followed fact. Once again, certain elements and phrases have been included to maintain flow and continuity and it is acknowledged that small parts are inevitably speculative, but these do not impact the factual thread. Now though, I pass into the realms of speculation, for records show that Lancaster JB150 SR-S for "Sugar" was posted missing and later, on the morning of the 1st September 1943, FTR (Failed to Return). Subsequent records conclude "no traces found", a situation that persists to this day.

So what happened to Cecil and the crew of JB150, SR-S? With no hard evidence we cannot be sure, we may only speculate; all things considered, the main possibilities would seem to be as follows:

- a "conventional German night fighter attack, SR-S either being shot down into the sea or exploding in mid-air due to fuel tanks/lines and/or bomb load being hit;
- a German "Schrage Musik" night fighter attack (Schrage Musik Jazz Music) was the German code
 name for night fighters fitted with angled, upward firing cannon to the rear of the cockpit. This system
 enabled the fighter to "slide" undetected beneath the target bomber and fire upwards with the
 cannon at the "cross shaped" target, often hitting fuel and or bombs causing a fatal explosion or at
 least shooting the bomber down;
- German anti-aircraft "flak" from either barge/ship mounted AA guns or ground installations, particularly the 88 mm flak guns, some of which were radar directed. Again, SR-S may have exploded due to direct fuel/bomb load hits or been shot down into the sea.

On the face of it, one of the night fighter scenarios may be more likely, fighter attacks accounted for two thirds of RAF bombers lost that night, 19 were shot down along the outgoing route, 22 in the target area or along the first 70 miles of the return leg with a further 6 lost after this stretch. Either way there would have been at least 7 empty beds at RAF Ludford Magna on the morning of 1st September 1943.

In due course 6 telegrams would arrive at homes across the UK with a further one going long distance to Australia. One of these was delivered to Stainsby Avenue, Horsley Woodhouse, informing Cecil's family that he was missing as a result of air operations on the night of 31st Aug./1st Sept. '43. This may have been followed by a letter confirming that Cecil was missing but that this did not necessarily mean that he had been

killed or wounded, beginning an agonising period of hope that Cecil had somehow survived a crash and was a POW or still trying to get back somewhere. After some six months, during which no further word was received, there would have been a further communication stating that, in view of the significant lapse of time and lack of any further information in response to official enquiries, it was with deep regret that Cecil's death as a result of air operations was now assumed. Even then hope would linger, until at some

point would come the acceptance that Cecil was gone.

Epilogue

Just off Cooper's Hill Lane, Runnymede, Surrey, is the Air Forces Memorial. Opened in October 1953, the memorial commemorates the 20,389 airmen and women lost in WW2 from bases in the UK and NW Europe with no known grave. Panel 141 carries the name of (Sergeant) Cecil Bardill, Flight Engineer, RAF VR, one of the crew of Avro Lancaster JB150, SR-S, missing, failed to return. His fellow crew members are listed as follows:
