### The history of World War One

The greatest sacrifice for any community is the lives of its young men. This has become the overriding image of the First World War. It was a war like never before, it affected everyone in a way that no previous wars had. Wars had been fought by professional soldiers in foreign lands. The First World War pitched volunteers into battle and mobilised civilians on the home front.

Such was the scale of death in Europe that it was not possible to transport the fallen back to their home countries for burial. Hundreds of thousands of grieving mothers and wives did not have the simple comfort of being able to visit the final resting place of their loved ones.

The whole country was affected in some way and everyone was urged to help with the war effort. Children were encouraged to pick blackberries to supply jam to the services. The children of the Derbyshire village of Parwich did their bit for jam.

The demand for cordite, used in explosive shells, outstripped the supply of wood chippings used to make a chemical for its production. A scheme was proposed to extract the same chemical from conkers and children were paid by the weight they collected. Matlock Bath school children helped out in conker collecting.

The sheer scale of the war is darkly impressive. Although the Second World War was bigger still, the First World War was the first of its kind. Never had so many countries been involved in war, or so many men. Everything was scaled up to cope with the demands of keeping the war effort going. A document produced by The War Office in 1922, records the statistics of the War and illustrates in mind numbing figures just what an all-consuming monster the conflict was.

In just 1918 the following was supplied to the troops in France:

Fifty seven thousand six hundred and eighty tons of biscuits, nine million six hundred thousand knives and forks, four million spoons, three million six hundred and thirty thousand mess tins, one hundred and ninety six thousand kettles, three million six hundred and forty thousand razors, six thousand four hundred and thirty two tons of tobacco and cigarettes, twenty five million six hundred and ninety three thousand wooden tent pegs.

Over half a million miles of barbed wire was shipped out in 1918 weighing one hundred and three thousand eight hundred tons. It would stretch to the moon and back.

Some equipment was repaired in repair centres rather than replaced. One such repair centre, in just six months from January to June 1918, cleaned and repaired over four and a half million items, including over one million blankets and half a million greatcoats and leather jerkins

(waistcoats). Another repaired between twenty five and thirty thousand pairs of boots each week.

The British alone fired 8.5 billion bullets in the course of the War, an average of 63 per second for every second of the four years. These were the .303 standard rifle and machine gun cartridges and if laid end-to-end, would go around the world 17 times.

During the War it was necessary to train cooks to feed the troops from the field kitchens. Sixty seven thousand were trained in the UK, twenty five thousand in France, three thousand in Egypt and two and a half thousand in Italy, Greece and Constantinople (Isatnbul, Turkey).

In 1917, when food supplies were tight, rabbits were used to supplement soldiers' meat rations. To cope with the left overs, the Army Rabbit Skin Clearing Committee was formed, they 'cleared' five million six hundred and fifty thousand rabbit skins, which were sold for a total of £123,192 At the time of the Armistice on 11<sup>th</sup> November, 1918, the Royal Army Service Corps was feeding over five and a half million men.

### County Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

Amber Valley Borough Council, along with five other Councils in Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire, has decided not sign up to the proposed North Midlands Devolution Deal. Local Authorities were being asked to commit to a Deal that had yet to be finalised and had not undergone public consultation.

I can understand Greater Manchester, whose economy is bigger than Wales, wanting a say on how money is raised and spent, and why Devolution works for them. But when you look at the aims of the North Midland Deal, they have just fine-tuned the aims of the D2N2/Local Enterprise Partnership, which we have had since 2010. A Local Enterprise Partnership that will still exist even with a Combined Authority.

Plus, how much is a 3rd Tier of Local Government going to cost? No doubt several millions of pounds, money I would prefer spent on front line services, rather than on bureaucracy. As for benefits for Amber Valley, they boil down to the possibility of influencing the allocation of resources, which are already being spent in the local area.

The success of any Combined Authority relies on economic growth. Yet, the Deal lacks the inclusion of Leicestershire and, more importantly, East Midlands Airport, which I think is essential to establish a Free Trade Zone. That would then give this region the economic clout that is required for it to be successful.

I certainly have concerns that even after 12 months, the actual Agreement itself has too many issues that are unquantifiable, uncertain, contain unknown costs and potential liabilities, to outweigh any possible spin off benefits for Amber Valley at this time.

Derbyshire County Council has now completed its review of 20 mph speed limits and zones. It has produced a 42-page report that incorporates 11 recommendations. Emphasis still remains about reducing actual casualties. The Cabinet will consider whether it will accept some, or all, of the recommendations and will respond in May 2016. However, the police have changed their policy, in that they will no longer object to 20 mph limits or zones and enforcement will be conducted in the same way as enforcement for other speed limits.

The Council has now produced its Council Plan priorities for 2016/2017, these are available on its website.

It would appear that the Highways Winter Budget has overspent by £1.3m, with the main expenditure being on grit and staff wages. This was queried, as it has been such a mild winter, the response was that it was due to increased potholes. I'm still scratching my head on that one!

Consultation is currently being undertaken in respect of subsidised bus routes. Legally, the Council does not have to provide subsidised bus routes or Community Transport Dial-a-Bus shopping buses. Please make your views known by the online questionnaire on Derbyshire County Councils Website, or pick up a paper copy at your local library.

#### **February**

- Cllr Buttery reported that he is organising Amber Fest this year, which will be held in Alfreton, this is to promote market towns for all of Derbyshire and will be held in May 2016.
- Members asked Cllr Buttery to confirm what Derbyshire County Council's school crossing patrol policy is for Horsley Woodhouse Primary School.

#### March

- Cllr Buttery confirmed by email that Horsley Woodhouse crossing patrol is to be retained by Derbyshire County Council for the foreseeable future and that the School Patrol Crossing is not a statutory requirement and it is the responsibility of parents/guardians for getting children to school safely.
- A cultivation licence for the piece of land across from the Doctors has been granted, this area will be maintained by the Parish Council in the future.

#### Recreation Matters (Feb):

- Litter Bins Cllr Buttery reported that a litter bin at Four Lane Ends has been installed.
- Members were very disappointed to learn that a large hole has been made in the
  cemetery fence from the Sitwell Recreation Ground; the fence has now been repaired,
  and will hopefully remain intact for the foreseeable future. However, it was noted by
  members that this fence has been vandalised on several occasions in the past and are
  concerned that someone appears to be cutting through the hedge to gain access from the
  recreation ground to the cemetery.

In the terms of the conveyance for the Horeston Recreation Ground money received will be spent on the redevelopment of the play area on the recreation ground.
