Odyssey of an engine - Part 1

Reading my father's article on the village's contribution to WW2 prompted me to "turn back the clock" to revisit the story of a particular wartime aero-engine and an enduring connection with RAF Digby in Lincolnshire. So, back to formative years.....

Ben Gregory and I grew up in Horsley Woodhouse in the 1960's and 70's. With my dad working at Rolls-Royce, a factory referred to as "Spitfire" (Wigley's) on Horsley Lane, close to Ben's home and the local knowledge of those who were there at the time still on tap, it was not long before we became aware of the aero-engine and

airframe related operations carried out in the village during and after WW2. It also became clear that a good proportion of engines dismantled in Horsley Woodhouse were the renowned Rolls-Royce Merlin, probably the most famous piston engine of WW2, if not of all time and the favoured power plant for many aircraft types, including the Spitfire and Hurricane fighters, Lancaster and Halifax four engine "heavies" and the twin engine "wooden wonder" Mosquito; to us youngsters the Merlin was simply the "stuff of legend", there was nothing to beat it.

So many engines had been dismantled in the village that, towards the end of operations, many smaller parts such as

nuts, bolts and washers and the larger rocker arms, cam carriers and the like, had been dumped on farm tracks and open ground in addition to the working sites; we often had sessions of prising up parts from the ground, particularly the "Legion Yard" (generally unsurfaced in those days). Certain other components had been put to alternative use about village homes, including rocker covers used as chicken feed and water troughs, stud bolts employed as pokers and rocker bars as chrysanthemum stakes, even the wooden engine crates found use in garage and chicken shed construction. What we most wanted though, was to find a whole engine; we had heard various rumours about engines being dumped in holes or shafts but, as the years passed, the rumours remained just that.

Time moved on, work days commenced for both of us, the interest did not fade but any chance of ever getting our hands on a Merlin seemed a "non-starter", the "Horsley Woodhouse engines" were long gone. Then, in the early 1980's we heard a rumour that a sizeable engine had been unearthed at Valley Farm, Heage, during excavation of footings for a new farm building. Initially we paid little attention, probably an old tractor engine or something, finally though, curiosity got the better of us, perhaps it was just worth a look? you never know.


We visited the farm and found the engine which, by then, had been "dumped" in a hollow near to the new building works. It was caked in soil but we hardly needed a second glance to know it was a large V12, the sump, supercharger and certain other components were missing but, after a further look it was pretty clear that this was essentially a Merlin. We asked the farmer (Mr Thompson I think) if we could have the engine, his reply was along the lines of "if you can move it you can have it", then, after a short reflection, "p'rhaps you better give me a tenner"! - some things are the same the world over. So, how to move it?

Fortunately, we had friends in the form of the Fletcher family who, at the time, kept a farm at Bell Lane, Smalley and they had a front-loading tractor; so, off to Bell Lane. Joe Fletcher was obliging – yes, we could borrow the tractor and a trailer (I think we

collected lifting chains from Ben's garage along the way). So, we were soon trundling back to Heage. The engine being in a hollow made things a bit awkward, Ben was used to driving the tractor but I recall it was a bit of a struggle – the tractor had a concrete counterbalance weight and I remember it was "touch and go", the tractor rocking on the point of balance at one stage. Ben succeeded though, the Merlin was lowered onto the trailer, the farmer's palm "crossed with silver" and we were off to Horsley

Woodhouse and Ben's garage. Ben "knocked up" a metal frame and we sat the Merlin on it. Not that we knew it then but it would stay in the garage for over 15 years, moved around the floor whenever space was needed.

We wanted to find out more about the engine; the main "engine plate" had long gone but, fortunately, the engine serial number was stamped on the front cam carrier. The only problem was that one digit was partly obscured, it could have been a 1 or a 7. We supplied the two possible numbers to the Rolls-Royce Heritage Society explaining the problem, they came back with corresponding details; if the number was 178239, it had been fitted in a Halifax bomber based at RAF Snaith (Yorkshire), if on the other hand, the number was 118239, it had been installed in an Avro Lancaster bomber based at RAF Swinderby, Lincolnshire – how could we find out which scenario it was? As it turned out

it was the exhaust stubs that provided the answer; searching through books and images it became clear that the shape of the stubs differed significantly between the various aircraft types in which the Merlin was fitted. The stubs to our engine were flat and swept back in a curve, a comparison of Halifax and Lancaster engine installation pictures resolved the matter, our stubs matched that of Merlin powered Avro Lancasters, the Merlin stubs to the Halifax bomber were, indeed, distinctly different. Details supplied by Rolls-Royce for our engine are reproduced as follows: Rolls-Royce Merlin 22, Engine No. 118239:

- Built at Derby as part of a batch of 400No. produced between 5/04/1943 and 26/6/1943 under order No. 7080, part of overall contract No. B 67950/40.
- Engine No. 118239 was completed on 9/04/1943.
- Engine then despatched to RAF Swinderby on 13/04/1943 where it was installed in an Avro Lancaster airframe.
- Some unspecified maintenance work was carried out by Sunbeam Talbot (possibly in the London area) on 31/08/1943.
- The engine was overhauled at St Athan on 17/08/1945, no further details known after this date.

We did try to find out which particular Lancaster the engine had been fitted in, hoping to learn of the aircraft's history and possibly that of the crew; our enquiries found though, that Swinderby's wartime engineering records had been

disposed of. Of some consolation is the fact that, at the time the engine was installed, RAF Swinderby was home to 1660 HCU

(Heavy Conversion Unit) flying Avro Lancaster bombers, it is quite possible, therefore, that our Merlin saw service over Germany as many HCU bombers took part in raids and feint attacks, particularly in the period leading up to D -Day.

Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

Derby and its immediate surroundings are expected to accommodate significant housing and employment growth in the future. As a result, the traffic demands on the A38 passing through Derby are forecast to grow quicker than the national average. Consequently, existing delays at the junctions on the A38 through the City are expected to worsen due to increased levels of traffic, hence the need for highway improvements.

Highways England is proposing an A38 Grade Separated Junctions Scheme, defining it as a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project. The key features of the preferred route are to:

- Lower the A38 to pass underneath the modified Kingsway and Markeaton junctions;
- Widen the A38 to three lanes in each direction between the Kingsway and Kedleston Road junctions;
- Build two new bridges to carry the A38 traffic over the modified roundabout at the Little Eaton junction.

All existing footways and cycleways will be maintained and where necessary they will be rerouted around the new roundabout. Signal controlled crossings will be provided for users to cross the slip roads. Full details of the consultation and associated design and layout plans and Preliminary Environmental Information Report (PEIR), can be viewed at the following link:

If you would like to comment on the consultation proposals, particularly the design and layout plans and PEIR, you can do so via the above link. Alternatively, let me know as I will need to feed back by the 5⁺ October.

Existing School Crossing Patrols, which is not a statutory function for the Council, was being looked at to achieve £300,000 worth of savings. Feedback from schools, town and parish councils highlighted the value of this service, therefore it will remain as it is. However, this means that the £300,000 planned savings will have to be found from elsewhere in the Highways budget. I am certainly advocating for capital monies to be utilised for replacing suitable sites with pelican/zebra type crossings. This will incur significant cost and could only be achieved over time, but I feel it is worthy of long term consideration.

I appreciate many of us are just putting away our sun cream after

a hot and dry summer, but trying to plan ahead, our thoughts have already turned to preparations for the winter snow. Derbyshire County Council want to hear from residents and farmers willing to help keep our communities safe when bad weather hits. With 3,500 miles of road and pavements, help from residents and contractors is greatly appreciated.

Horsley Woodhouse and Smalley Royal British Legion

The Legion meets first Monday in each month at 7.30 pm in the Legion Hall.

During August the Royal British Legion undertook a massive pilgrimage to Belgium and France to mark the 1928 event; when the fledgling Legion took several thousand wives, mothers, fathers and children whose loved one's lay in newly created cemeteries from the Northern extremity of the Western Front right down to the Somme area and beyond. These people would have had little hope of ever seeing their loved one's grave. It was to the eternal credit of the Legion that they undertook this huge logistical task of moving and caring for these numbers during their stay on the Continent in

1928. The 2018 visit code named G90 commemorated the event with 1100 branch standards plus 1100 wreath bearers travelled over. Spending four days paying their respects at sites from Passchendaele, Messines, Hill 60, and Tyne-Cot in the North to Vimy, Arras, Thiepval, Poziere, Delville Wood and The Ulster Tower at the Southern end of the old front line.

Horsley Woodhouse standard bearer Terry Whittaker and yours truly took part in the final big parade in Ypres "Wipers" to the Tommies and to march through the City to the Menin Gate in the footsteps of our forebears was a privilege and a moving experience. The Woodhouse standard will have a scroll attached to commemorate the day and our wreath with the branch logo

was removed from under the Gate and put on display along with 10,999 others on the Ypres ramparts (which gave shelter to our men from the incessant shelling) where it remained until the end of August. *See U-tube RBLG90 for pictures of the parade and ceremony.*


NEW MINISTER As from 1st September Revd John Malnutt has been our Minister. It's John's first appointment since leaving Theological College and we welcome John, and his

Welcome Back Georgie – Indian

The trip was amazing thank you - well worth the hard work. I flew from Birmingham to Doha, then from Doha to Delhi. We then drove to a hostel in Delhi where we only slept for two hours to then be picked up at 7.00 am (Delhi time) to be taken to get a train to Agra. From there we were taken on a tour of the Taj Mahal, Agra Fort and the place where they bought the marble to make the Taj. We then got on the 12 hour coach journey to Palampur.

We were invited by the owners of the holiday home to attend a family party in the town as their son and grandson had come to visit from

Canada. The next day we set off for our first day of teaching. The school was a 45 minute drive away as the schools in our immediate area were quite wealthy. The school was founded in 1994, being run in a two-room mud house and had an enrolment of 30 children. At present, the school is a concrete building with 150 children. FutureSense has been working with the school since 2014.

We split ourselves into two groups and taught two classes apart and then the eldest together. We spent our evenings lesson planning. I was very surprised by how much English the children already knew; it was just a matter of helping them construct sentences out of the vocabulary they had learnt. There were lower

kindergarten, upper kindergarten and 1sts in one group, 2nds and 3rds in another, 4ths and 5ths, 6s and 7s and then we all taught 8s, 9s and 10s together. The children were aged two and a half to 15 years old. We also did renovation work in the garden and painted one of the classrooms which I particularly enjoyed as I love art!

During our time there we celebrated one of the Hindu God's birthday; we were invited to a celebration with the school at a temple two minutes

down the road. We ate with the children there. We also celebrated Teacher's Day with them. They held an assembly of singing, speeches, games and dancing. They did another celebration on our final day.

On our weekends we visited Bir Billing and Dharmshala (where the Dali Lama lives). I ate mostly Tibetan food

as we were in the Himalayas close to Tibet and China. I was shocked at the amount of homelessness, disease, rubbish and strays I saw. Everyone we met were very hospitable and wanted to know about our volunteering. The kids were enthusiastic and eager to learn. I loved every minute of it and can't wait to return one day.

Georgie, very well done to you and your Team. In addition to doing a load of good in your young lives, you've also had a wonderful experience.....it just goes to show doesn't it! With respect and Congratulations from your Village.
