Continuing on from 'Rambling Through Time' - a resident's perspective

After reading 'Rambling Through Time' in the last edition (Aug/Sep 2023) it suggested that Wudus was known as "Herring City" because of the shortage of herrings in Kilburn due to them all sold in Wudus. It may have helped but the real reason for this nick name came into being after a short discussion between two colliers in Heanor pit bottom. During a snap break the Heanor collier asked the Wudus one, "what's in your snap", "Jam and Herrings" was the reply and this response spread quickly through the pit and up the shaft and spread like wildfire to all the other local pits. There after all the residents of Wudus lived in the "JAM AND HERRING CITY" which was rather grand compared with the one earned by Kilburn which was "KILBURN BUCKET BANGERS"; that is another story.

Being a lifelong resident of this village, born here 84 years ago and knowing that my ancestors had lived here for the last two hundred years with at least three Ben Turners, a great grandmother born here and now our daughter lives in the same house (once famous when it became involved in the case of the three murderers from Heage) where the saying comes from they hang them in bunches! The house my mother was born in still stands today.

I was born in Daisy Bank which had no electricity, one cold water tap, an outside toilet called a double holer which enabled two persons to perform side by side which was emptied by Mister Hicklin into a large barrel mounted on the back of a small dray drawn by a single horse.

This house overlooked a pork butchers' shop and slaughterhouse, pigs only and when we were kids, we used to help in scraping the carcasses just to be given a pig's bladder which made fine balloons. The rest of the pig was turned into joints of meat, pork pies, sausage, chicklins, tripe, black pudding, polony etc., all sold in the shop only the squeal went to waste.

Great grandfather Ben Turner was a nail maker, and his workshop was located at the rear of the cottages at Cross End and once a week he took his hand made nails all the way to Nottingham in a small pony and trap and often on his way back he would fall asleep, and the pony would come all the way home and right into the yard.

Great uncle Herbert Marshall used to keep a shop directly opposite Top Lane (now The Crescent) and sold everything. Next to his shop there was and still is a small lane leading to the fields and down this lane on the right-hand side stood several small workshops, one being a blacksmith's which I can remember quite well. I could write a book about Wudus.

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"RAMBLING" THROUGH TIME

(A serialised alternative history of Horsley Woodhouse) Part 14. Back where we began......

Hello again, here we are at the beginning of our final Ramble as we find ourselves rapidly approaching yet another Christmas. I wonder if the time passed so quickly for the people in the olden days of the Village.

We set off from the top of The Crescent. Turning to our right we soon see The Old Oak, one of our two remaining pubs. The Sitwell being the other, as previously mentioned. Thankfully they are both busy and are valued assets to the life of the village, hosting a variety of community events as well as the usual activities expected of licensed premises. A warm welcome is guaranteed at both.

We continue a little further on from The Old Oak and we see a row of semi-detached houses. These were the

first council houses to be built, followed by the ones on Stainsby Avenue, at the other end of the village. Directly opposite is the comparatively recently opened Coop Stores. It stocks an excellent range of items and has long opening hours, it's another asset to our village as most of the original shops are now long since gone. This was built on the site of the old Working Men's Club. In its hey-day this Club hosted many, many happy family times. There were numerous entertainments and activities as well as the facility of a licensed bar. There were Christmas parties organised for the children and a present for each child was always handed out. There were also dart and domino teams who were part of the Belper League and these were keenly supported. All this and much more was available for everyone to participate, and the bonus was, like everything else in the village, it was all on the doorstep.



Back onto the opposite side of the road again and we arrive at the Arthur Medical Centre and the Amber Pharmacy which were built on the corner of Horeston Recreation Ground. They are modern and necessary welcome additions which replace the old doctor's surgery at his home at Dunadae, adjacent to the Church. Their predecessor on Horeston Rec was the Miners Welfare. This building unusually was erected on "stilts" and was another venue for varied activities for the people of the village. A Cinema Night was held on a Monday evening, with a gentleman coming from Long Eaton with a film. First it would be shown at the Welfare and would then be taken to Kilburn for a another showing the following evening. There was a Guides night and the Committee met to arrange a party for the Old Folks. There were home football matches played on the Rec, as the Welfare had a team. When it rained the team used the space under the building, (as it was on "stilts") to shelter. It was also perhaps a handy retreat for courting couples in those happy days.

If we cross back over the road again and wander down Golden Valley, between the Co-op and Horeston Cottages, we find ourselves on an attractive residential lane. It leads down to the starting point of our Rambles in June/July 2021. This is where the Ancient Britons during the years BC constructed a track over our area to transport lead from the Peak District. Later, when the Romans arrived on our shores, they built one of their famous roads over it. This was Rykeneld or Rykneild Street.

Here we are, back where we began and the rest in between, is as they say...... history. The majority of the journey has taken us through Ethel's memories, but we must also acknowledge some of the notable national and local events which the village has experienced. The introduction of streetlamps and a gas supply, the telephone became an indispensable means of communication and there were huge steps

forward in education, computerisation and medical and surgical discoveries. There were two World Wars with huge loss of life nationally. The 1918 – 1920 and the more recent Pandemic also took a massive toll. The Great Depression which played havoc with the economy, causing much desperate poverty in the 1930s. Ironically, there is again turmoil in the economy following in the wake our recent Pandemic. Fashions, music, entertainment, space travel and much more have evolved at an astonishing rate.

The transformation of everyday life has been rapid and remarkable to bring us to where we are today, with the majority of employment no longer being accessible on foot or bicycle, but at the end of an often, quite lengthy car, bus or train journey. The mining has gone and most of the small local farms have largely disappeared. The way of life in the village has radically changed, but proudly, Horsley Woodhouse and its people have adjusted, coped and continue to thrive..... long may it last.

My sincere gratitude to Miss Ethel Stanton for her friendship and helping me to settle in the village nearly 35 years ago and for the gift of her lifetime of memories. Geoff Nash for generously sharing lengthy phone calls, knowledge, his memories and wonderful friendship with me. Duane Bestwick, Della Woods Bestwick, Geoff Nash, Paula Nash and Karen Hardy for providing photos and illustrations. Di Cliff and Don



Barham for their memories and dates etc., and thanks to Tania Pells, the editor of the Wudhus News for her skill and expertise in putting the "Ramblings" into print. I couldn't have done it without you All, thank you so much. (Additional dates from a history of the Village by Rev. Peter Lyne.)

There have intentionally been very few specific names, dates or accolades. This has been with the hope that the descriptions of the lifestyle over the years in our Village has revived many memories of the day to day lives in times gone by for our longstanding families and evoked a heightened sense of belonging for our more recent residents as they become more familiar with the local way of life as it used to be.

Winter Pressures – change to appointment system

Each year, General Practice surgeries experience a sharp increase in demand for appointments and treatment over the winter period. This is caused by various factors, such as an increase in seasonal viral infections, however the increased demand is largely for acute or urgent 'on-the-day' appointments and services.

What is happening this winter?

Over this year, all GP Surgeries have faced a sustained increase in demand for patient appointments. NHS England usually provides GP Surgeries with additional funding to provide additional 'on-the-day' appointments and services, to help meet expected seasonal increases in demand. NHS England and the local Integrated Care Board have recently confirmed that there will be no additional funding for GP Surgeries to provide additional appointments this year. This presents a serious challenge to all practices in terms of how to manage increased demand without additional resources or support.

In advance of the expected winter pressures, the team at Arthur Medical Centre have met to plan the most appropriate strategy for ensuring provision of services to our patients with our available resources. Previous years have shown that the majority of patients contacting the practice over winter require urgent, 'on-theday' appointments, whilst staff sickness presents a problem for pre-booked appointments which then have to be rearranged at very short notice. It is apparent that the most appropriate solution would be for the practice to change our appointment system to an all 'on-the-day' model from November through to the end of January.

What is changing and when?

From the beginning of November, our GP appointments system will be phased towards this 'all on-the-day' model, with limited numbers of pre-bookable appointments being used for patients who have been asked to book a future appointment by their GP. This system will last until the end of January, unless another solution or additional support for the practice becomes available. A number of future 'follow-up' appointments will still be available for our doctors to book for patients who they feel need to be seen again in the near future. This does not affect appointments with other members of our team, for example nurses, mental health workers, physiotherapists etc.

What if I want to book a GP appointment for a date in the future?

Over the period from November to end of January, we will generally not be able to book future GP appointments. If you have a need for an appointment in the future, we ask that you contact the practice on that day to request an appointment. In cases where you genuinely cannot call the practice on the day to book a GP appointment, we ask that you contact the practice through our website, http://www.arthurmedicalcentre.co.uk/, using the Contact Us Online function. Please complete the form in full, advising what the problem is and what circumstances are preventing you from booking an 'on-the-day' appointment by phone. Where appropriate, the team will review your request and respond, however this is not a route to request an appointment when we are full for the day.

What if there are no appointments left on the day?

As before, a GP surgery only has so much capacity and when appointments are fully booked, we are unable to simply provide more with the resources available. When this happens you will be asked to phone NHS111 who will provide an appropriate route for your problem. Please understand that this is not a personal rejection, but simply that the Practice's capacity within which we can safely deliver care, is now full due to demand from other patients.

How you can help us

Please understand that the practice does its best to provide an excellent service at all times and in times of increased pressure, measures need to be in place to try to serve high patient demand with the resources that are available. We also ask that you are considerate towards our Care Navigation staff, who work very hard to support the wellbeing of all of our patients. Our team do their best to provide the best care possible to you within their resources and a difficult interaction with a patient can often have an emotional impact on the member of staff, which then affects how they are able to help other patients.

Flu and Covid Vaccinations

Our team has worked very hard to deliver an efficient and effective Covid and Flu vaccination service over the month of October. Our programme has been successful, and we are delighted to be able to offer this service again from our practice in Horsley Woodhouse. Whilst the collaborative efforts with our partner practices from Babington Hospital in previous years was also successful, we are committed to serving our locality as best we can and the feedback we have received thus far has shown that this has been appreciated. We would like to thank our patients for supporting this effort. There are remaining appointments in November for Covid and Flu vaccinations and we encourage all eligible patients to book for your jabs to ensure you are protected as we move into the winter.

Practice Statistics

As of 1st November 2023, we have 9,131 patients registered with the Practice. In October AMC has:

- handled 5,137 incoming telephone calls (an average of 234 calls handled per working day). This compares
 to 4,206 calls over the same period last year an increase of 22%
- provided 4,427 patient appointments in total across the last four weeks (an average of 170 per working day) This includes vaccination appointments
- Of these appointments, around 53% of the total were face to face GP appointments (our levels of face-to-face appointments are now largely a matter of patient choice at the time of booking)

Since April, road safety staff have delivered six 'First Gear' predriver workshops for students aged 15-17. We have another six dates planned between October and March. The courses have been extremely popular, all courses are fully booked.

Road safety education and training

Over the last academic year Road Safety Officers have delivered 553 road safety workshops in primary and secondary schools. Topics covered included crossing the road safely, in-car safety and independent journeys.

Child car seat checks

As part of our ongoing commitment to reducing car passenger casualties, road safety officers have carried out three child car seat safety check events at supermarkets across the county. We have delivered seven child car seat training courses to social care teams. All road safety staff are Institute of Occupational Safety and Health accredited in child car seat fitting and training.

The trusted Trader Scheme celebrates 15 years

This scheme helps Derbyshire residents to find trustworthy tradespeople and services around 1,000 traders and services, ranging from plumbers, electricians, gardeners, joiners and decorators to electric vehicle charger installers, accountants, dog walkers, removal firms and will writers, have registered as Trusted Traders since the scheme was set up in 2008.

It was launched to help local people find traders and businesses who agree to do a good job at a fair price and deliver good customer service. It's also aimed at protecting consumers by making it easier for them to find and use traders they can trust, rather than falling foul of rogue traders cold-calling and using high pressure sales techniques. **Visit the DDC Website, and type "Trusted Trader Derbyshire" in your search bar.**

One of the borough council responsibilities is planning. From being contacted about proposals for extensions to existing homes, to the building of a new house, through to the current proposals just outside the village for a large solar farm, they will always seek to act for you. This might be supporting someone to raise concerns about a planning application, calling in a proposal for consideration by the planning board at Amber Valley Borough Council and for the solar farm, a public consultation evening was arranged for local residents to find out more at The Bell in Smalley. Both will certainly be keeping a close eye on this and are keen to hear everyone's views. It is also worth remembering that the Parish Council is asked for its views on any planning application in the village although it doesn't make the decisions.

Although highways are not the responsibility of the Borough Council, many residents have continued to raise concerns about traffic and speeding through the village. In Smalley, Lian and Amanda are part of a local Community Speedwatch which can play its part in reducing speeding. Volunteers are able to carry out high visibility speed checks at approved locations in conjunction with the police. Horsley Woodhouse Parish Council is hoping that enough volunteers come forward to be trained in the new year to mean we can have Community Speedwatch in the village as well. Both councillors have already said they will take part to.

Your councillors were pleased to have attended Remembrance events at Richardson Endowed school and St John the Baptist Church in Smalley. Seeing the poppies that had been made by the pupils along the roads, together with the turnout of local residents at the many other memorial events shows the importance of continuing to remember those who lost their lives in conflict.

Bus Forum and Services

Many of you have passed on, to the local Bus Forum, your personal issues and commented on the poor level of bus services locally. Your concerns have been and continue to be referred to both the transport team at Derbyshire County Council (DCC), as well as your elected representatives. Please continue to do so using the email link below or if you prefer to, write it down.

It is important we express our views to them collectively through as large a representation of residents as possible. We are working on an independent Bus Service Consultation that we would like to engage you with please. Through this you will soon be invited to indicate what matters most to you when it comes to improving the bus services locally. The Bus Forum as well as the residents we surveyed, were originally hopeful, following the publication of the government 'Bus Back Better' scheme and DCC's Bus Service Improvement Plan, that our bus services would get a lot better locally.

Extracts from the DCC Plan of 2021: "Derbyshire is **determined to grasp the opportunity** to build "Bus Back Better" and deliver a **bold and ambitious** Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) in Derbyshire". "Our challenge is to **"level-up"** bus travel across the county by bringing **all our services** up to the high standards of our very best ones."

The Plan included bus passenger number targets to be achieved by 2025, using the £47m funding allocated. **Two years on, is an extract from the latest DCC Performance Report 2023:**

"BSIP has been amended to provide a realistic but challenging performance target". This new target for 2024/25 gives the same bus passenger numbers as that for 2019/20, indicating a **"Zero"** level of achievement over five years.

We have indicated to DCC that instead of delivering a Levelling Up of Bus Services across the County, they have now created a Two-Tier service, improvements on the main routes and deteriorating ones on the others.
