# What a turn out - no rain this year!!





# Horsley Woodhouse Pupils Successful Challenge

# 'We Will Remember Them'

#### Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen (Known Graves)

### Private William Dunn, Special Brigade (Reserve Company), Pioneer Corps, Royal Engineers, WW1

William Dunn was the husband of Mary Ann of 29, Pickering Street, Stapenhill, Burton-on-Trent. Records confirm that he served as a Private (strictly speaking a Pioneer) in the Reserve Company of the Special Brigade, Pioneer Corps, Royal Engineers in the First World War, Service No. 128307.

"Special Brigade" suggests something out of the ordinary and it certainly was. WW1 saw the first significant use of chemical weapons, particularly gas. The first effective use was by the Germans on the 22<sup>nd</sup> April 1915 in the Ypres Salient where 180 tonnes of chlorine was released from a total of 5,730 iron cylinders across trenches held by French Colonial troops who fled from the choking yellow-green cloud. This became part of the Second Battle of Ypres during which the Germans used gas three more times. Prior to these occurrences, the British Army had no facility or capability for gas warfare.

Following the first use of gas by the Germans, Lord Kitchener authorised the implementation of "retaliatory measures". This led to the first use of gas by the British in the early stages of the Battle of Loos in September 1915. Special Engineering units were formed on a temporary basis to transport and release the (chlorine) gas. Things did not, however, go well, there were problems getting the gas

released, then the wind changed and blew some of it back so the offensive impact was strictly limited. A decision was, however, taken to formalise the special units and the result was the formation of the Special Brigade in the early part of 1916. The Brigade consisted of 4No. companies for the handling of gases released from cylinders, 4 more special companies to deal with the firing of gas filled shells from Stokes Mortars (4 inch mortar weapons, 48No. to a company) and 4No. special sections tasked with use of "flame-throwing" equipment. The Special Brigade numbered 208 officers and 5.306 men including those staffing a dedicated HQ and Depot.

The Brigade was brought up to "full strength" by adding volunteers from units already in France to the special companies. Later on drafts from England would further swell the numbers. The Special Brigade was commanded by Colonel C Foulkes (RE) under the title Assistant Director of Gas Services reporting to Brigadier-General H. Thullier (RE) Director of Gas Services. In addition, Lieutenant-Colonel S Cummins (RAMC) was appointed Director of Anti-Gas Measures. By late May 1916, No.1 and No.2 special battalions were attached to Fourth Army, No.3 to Second Army and No.4 to Third Army. No.5 was the Stokes Mortar section with three companies attached to Fourth Army and one to third Army.

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The Flame Thrower units arrived in France approximately one month later. Companies of the Special Brigade dealing with gas were "cylinder companies"; basically four men would operate a battery of 24No. cylinders although substantially more were needed to carry in the cylinders through the trench systems to the release point. Such carrying was done using an improvised stretcher carried by three or four men. From 1917, these companies had the Livens Projector, a large mortar like device firing flame, chemical ammunition (gas) or "oil bombs".

Chlorine gas was used at first but the success was limited because (after the experience of first use) it could be spotted in advance as a greenish-yellow cloud and it was soluble in water, so covering the mouth and nose with a damp cloth reduced its effect. Urine soaked cloth proved better as the chlorine reacted with urea negating the overall effect. Next to be used was phosgene, a colourless gas which was not easy to detect and caused immediate coughing and spluttering on human exposure meaning that more tended to be inhaled. Eventually blended with chlorine, the combination was referred to as "White Star" derived from the marking painted on shells filled with the mixture which provided another more controllable means of delivery (directional wind changes were always a hazard with cylinder release). Significant exposure to phosgene or White Star often proved fatal, its effects often being delayed so that apparently healthy soldiers actually succumbed up to 2 days after a gas attack. White Star was used fairly regularly by the British during the 1916 Somme Offensive.

Serving with the Reserve Company of the Special Brigade, William Dunn may well have seen gas and/or other weapons of "chemical warfare" at first hand, although to what extent may never be clear. He was invalided home from the Western Front at some point (the particular circumstances are not known to me) and died of "wounds received" on the 8<sup>th</sup> of January 1917 aged 24. He rests under a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone in Horsley Woodhouse village cemetery.

Germany further developed gas warfare with the introduction of "Mustard Gas" (dichlorodiethylsulphide) just before the

British offensive of "Passchendaele" (Third Ypres). German mustard gas shells were marked with a yellow cross hence the Germans referred to "Yellow Cross" when dealing with mustard gas. Exposure to mustard gas caused serious internal and external blistering often proving fatal. One drawback to the user with such gas was that it remained active within soil for some weeks after contact causing hazards when taking trenches infected by the attacker's previous gas shelling/exposure. By 1918, the main combatants were all using gas, mostly in the form of gas filled artillery shells. Despite an initial impact, including both physical and psychological effects, gas did not, as first thought; turn out to be the decisive weapon of the war. Methods to counter its effects were developed relatively quickly and these proved effective. After the Armistice of 1918, the revulsion against the use of gas in warfare was such that, by 1925, its use was outlawed, a ban that, in theory at least, still applies today.

### **Report from June and July Parish Council meetings**

#### June:

The Footpath Officer reported that there were presently no problems on the footpaths in the village. The majority of stiles have been replaced with kissing gates; Clerk reported that Derbyshire County Council (DCC) had been informed that the Parish Council would prefer kissing gates on the footpath down Golden Valley.

Cllr McGuinness reported that she will be applying for funding soon for the WW1 projects and a meeting has been set up with Glynn Wilton to discuss this. The project comprises of three sections:

- Living memorial i.e. trees, wild flowers
- Permanent memorial metal poppies by the millennium wall dedicated to those who fought in WW1
- Legacy memorial spreading information about WW1 through the Wudhus News, school and various community groups

#### July:

- Clerk reported that the hedge by the Gate at the Horeston Recreation Ground has been cut back and now closes
- Clerk to arrange for the verges to be cut back on Wood Lane and from Stainsby Avenue towards the Church
- The Parish Council is to proceed with the registering of the Old Oak Pub as a village asset
- Clerk to arrange with DCC for the drains to be cleaned out on Wood Lane
- The Audit for year ended March 2015 has now been completed

**Police Report (June)** - PC Emma Fisher and PSCO Courtney advised that there have been no reported crimes over the past month.

**Litter Bins -** Clerk reported that she has asked Amber Valley to suggest suitable bins that the operatives will be able to empty safely; these litter bins will replace the dog waste bins on the Sitwell Recreation Ground as Amber Valley now allows dog waste to be put into litter bins.

Cllr Seals inspected the Horeston Recreation Ground and Cllr McGuinness inspected the Sitwell Memorial Recreation Ground and have found no defects on the play equipment.

#### July:

Litter Bins - Two new litter bins have been ordered for the Sitwell Recreation Ground, these bins will take dog waste as well as litter.

# **County Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated**

Derbyshire County Council are conducting a review of 20mph Speed Limits and 20mph Zones. The review will gather evidence about their influence on road casualties, road users and local communities.

The last review took place in December 2011. That report concluded that 20mph speed limits and 20mph zones can be effective as casualty reduction measures, but they are most appropriate where there is an existing casualty record. At that time it recommended that 20mph speed limits and 20mph zones should be "used sparingly".

This new review should seek the views of Derbyshire road users and residents. The precise mechanism for this will be determined once the actual review-working group is convened. I anticipate this report will be published in six months' time. It should improve clarity, consistency of approach and greater transparency about the Council's decision making criteria for setting 20mph speed limits and 20mph zones.

Road surface dressing has taken place in the village, which helps to prolong the life span of the road, smoothing out some of those small road defects that don't qualify for immediate repair. Remember the quickest way to get potholes repaired is by reporting them, using the Road Fault Form on the Derbyshire County Council website <u>www.derbyshire.gov.uk</u>. Note the main roads do get priority over side roads.

In respect of Amber Valley Borough Council's Core Strategy, following material changes relating to planning issues, three strategic sites have been removed from the plan, and these are at Kedleston, Belper and Ripley. With one site being added at Langley Mill. The number of dwellings Amber Valley must make provision for has risen to just under 10,000. This is an increase of nearly 3,000 dwellings from the Plan that was originally submitted in 2014. If we don't accept to provide this figure, we are at an impasse and have no realistic prospect of getting an Adopted Core Strategy. Without an Adopted Core Strategy, we will continue to be picked off by Developers, with houses being built in areas we cannot defend.

I do not anticipate that the Planning Inspectorate will reconvene his meeting to consider Amber Valley Borough Council's Core Strategy until sometime in October 2015.

I had a great time at the Carnival, the weather was kind and it was good to see it was so well attended. As well as bringing the community together, it provides an opportunity for local groups and charities to raise funds, and local businesses to promote their services. I was more than happy to donate £600 from my Community Leadership Fund towards the event. I think we should all give a big thanks to the organisers, who work hard throughout the year to raise funds to put on a carnival on our behalf.
