‘We Will Remember Them’

Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen with known graves: Private Samuel Bacon, 10th Battalion Sherwood Foresters (Notts, & Derby), WW1



Samuel was born on the 24th October 1894, to parents Albert and Martha (née Rowland), at an address that appears to be “Sunny Side”, Woodhouse Road, Horsley Woodhouse, Derbyshire. He was christened on the 10th April 1895, at St Susanna’s Parish Church. The 1901 census lists Samuel as a Scholar aged 6 years (the census was conducted in March 1901). Samuel had an older brother, James Henry Bacon (aged 13 at the time), a younger brother Henry (aged 2) and two younger sisters, Matilda (4 years old) and Millicent (just 1 year old). Samuel’s father Albert was a coalminer by trade. There is an indication that the family may have lived in Heanor at some later time.

Sam would have been 19 when war was declared with Germany in August 1914, his military service began in 1916, records show he enlisted at Ilkeston and served, subsequently, with the 10th Battalion Sherwood Foresters (Notts. & Derby), Service No. 116379.

At the outbreak of the war, the Sherwood Foresters had eight battalions and a depot located in Derby. Over the course of the coming four years of conflict, the regimental strength increased to 33 battalions, with some 20 of these seeing action abroad. The 10th Battalion was formed in Derby in September 1914, as part of K2 (Kitchener’s Second New Army), joining the

51st Brigade in the 17th (Northern) Division. After local training, they moved on to Wool, then West Lulworth in October 1914, before returning to Wool in December. By June 1915, they were at Winchester to complete their final phase of training. Earmarked originally for Home Defence, their role was reversed and the Battalion were shipped to France, landing at Boulogne on the 14th July 1915, concentrating, thereafter, at St Omer. They moved on to the southern region of the Ypres Salient for a period of trench familiarisation after which they manned the frontline trenches in this locality. The spring of 1916 saw them in action at the Bluff, a feature to the SE of Ypres on the Comines canal (see also the account for Frederick Attenborough). Later that year they moved south to Picardy and the Somme area where they saw continuous fighting during the first 10 days of the major British offensive, commencing on the 1st July, including the Battles of Albert and Delville Wood. The battalion also took part in some of the later Somme actions in October and November before the “Big Push” finally wound down. In the early months of 1917, the Battalion were at Arras, fighting in the first and second Battles of the Scarpe and taking part in the capture and holding of Roeux. Later that year they fought in Flanders, at the first and second Battles of Passchendaele (part of Third Ypres), sustaining heavy casualties in this grim struggle.

Sam may well have seen some of these 1916 and '17 actions and he certainly went on to see more action in 1918. The first major action in what was to be the last year of the war, was the German Spring Offensive (Kaiserslacht), a huge effort launched in France on the 21st March, on a front from St Quentin to the Oise which saw at the outset, British Fifth and Third Armies pushed back over the hard-won ground of previous years. After the opening phase (code-named "Michael" by the Germans), the 10th Battalion Sherwood Foresters saw fighting at Bapaume on the 24th and 25th of March in terms of defensive actions as Third and Fifth Armies continued to withdraw. Eventually, however, the "headlong" German advance slowed, as its leading units outran their supply lines and became desperately short of food and other vital supplies.

By June, the German Army was largely exhausted, having sustained many casualties; their last effort came in mid-July, again with significant losses. The Allies hit back, starting what would become known as the "Hundred Days" with the Battle of Amiens on the 8th August. Sam was most probably present at this and the several actions that followed as the 10th Battalion's presence is noted at the battles of Albert (21-22 Aug.), Second Bapaume (21 Aug-1st Sept.), Havrincourt (12th Sept.) and Epehy (18th September, where attacks were carried out on German outpost positions in front of the Hindenburg Line). This was followed by fighting at Cambrai between the 27th of September and 11th October and the pursuit to and Battle of the Selle in the period 17th to the 26th October, during which the Germans were forced back to the Sambre-Oise canal. Again, Sam was probably present for a significant portion of this fighting. These actions preceded the Second Battle of the Sambre, which took place during the first week of November 1918 and proved to be the last battle fought by the British Army in WW1. British First, Third and Fourth Armies were involved in this major assault that took place on a front of almost 40 miles. 10th Battalion Sherwood Foresters were part of 4th Army, commanded by General Henry Rawlinson; Fourth Army formations faced the Germans along the Sambre-Oise canal and in defensive positions within and to the north of the Forest of Mormal. The attack began just before dawn on Monday the 4th November, with British infantry pushing forward through heavy mist, behind a strong supportive artillery barrage. British casualties were high, but, by nightfall, the Germans fell back in significant disarray. Fourth and Third Armies took German positions in the Forest of Mormal, Third Army took Le Quesnoy, with a dramatic action by the New Zealand Division and First Army also made good ground. Allied victory was, at last, in sight.

Sadly Samuel Bacon did not live to see it. He was killed on the 4th November 1918, just seven days before the Armistice, most probably during the battle described above, although exact circumstances are not known to me. He was buried in Englefontaine British Cemetery, France, Row D, Grave 44.

The town of Englefontaine lies astride a straight main road, running from Le Cateau (11km) to Bavay (16km). This road crosses another running from Le Quesnoy to Landrecies, on the western edge of the Forest of Mormal. The British Cemetery is sited north of Englefontaine, a short distance to the west of the "Bavay road" (D932).

Englefontaine British Cemetery was first established in November 1918; following the end of the war, it was enlarged by the concentration of 55 graves from a cemetery started, originally, in the garden of a house, in the hamlet of Les Tuileries. Englefontaine British Cemetery now has around 170 war graves, some 9 or 10 of which remain “unknown” at the time of publication.

Raising funds for St Susanna's Church

County Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

Derbyshire County Council had an underspend of £32 million on its annual half a billion pound budget.

I recently met with the Police and Crime Commissioner relating to his policing priorities. I requested that he look into the aspect of increasing the policing powers of Police Community Support Officers, who play an integral role in safer neighbourhood policing. This could enable them to address 'Quality of Life' issues such as litter, dog fouling and speeding that are priorities for many local communities.

A Special Constable, who is a volunteer, has all the powers of a constable. Whereas a fully employed Police Community Support Officer has very few powers. I do consider them to be a valuable resource, who can play a greater role and free up police officer time to enable them to concentrate on core policing tasks that require particular powers or expertise.

The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its initial proposals relating to the geographical area represented by a Member of Parliament. This will result in the reduction of Members of Parliament from 650 to 600. Each constituency is to have no fewer than 71,031 and no more than 78,507 electors. This is likely to save in excess of £12 million annually. There will be a 12 week consultation period about the proposed changes that ends on 5th December 2016. Full details are provided on the website www.bce2018.org.uk. You can give your views in writing to the Boundary Commission, or personally by attending their public hearing event, being held at the Cathedral Quarter Hotel, 16 St Mary's Gate, Derby on Thursday 27th – Friday 28th October 2016.

Horsley Woodhouse is likely to remain as part of the Amber Valley parliamentary constituency.
