'We Will Remember Them'

Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen with known graves:

Private Samuel Wheatley, 7th Battalion Canadian Infantry (British Columbia Regiment), WW1

Samuel was the son of Thomas and Eliza Wheatley, residents of Horsley Woodhouse according to the 1901 England & Wales Census. Samuel was one of eight sons (the other seven being: Thomas Henry (the oldest), Elijah, Wilfred, Arthur, Harold, Isaac and Joseph) and two daughters, Agnes and Annie. Born on the 4th March 1888, Samuel was the second oldest at 13 years in 1901, Thomas Henry being 15 years old at this time. Samuel is the Uncle of Madge Meakin (Carrfields) and the Great Uncle of Pam Durose of our village, he was the brother of Pam's Grandmother, Annie Oakley.

Samuel would have received basic schooling (presumably at Smalley Boys School as his name is on the memorial there) but his working life began early, at 13 years old his recorded occupation was "Pony Driver in Coal Mine".

Samuel and his older brother Thomas Henry Wheatley (known to all as "Harry") and (possibly) his younger brother Arthur, emigrated to Canada circa 1912 as many people did in the period prior to World War 1; other members of Sam's family would also emigrate to Canada at different times. Records show that Samuel became the husband of Lillian Florence Wheatley, a lady given to be "of Oxford Mills, Ontario, Canada". It seems that the couple settled in Calgary in the province of Alberta as did his brother "Harry" (I am not certain if Arthur was resident in Calgary). Samuel clearly made some progress in terms of employment because, by 1915, his profession is given as "Brewer".

So life was probably quite good for the newly married couple until, that is, World War 1 intervened. Britain declared war with Germany on the 4th August 1914 automatically bringing Canada into the conflict as a British Dominion; Canada duly responded to the call. Records show that Samuel enlisted for service at Calgary on the 4th November 1915, aged 27 years 8 months, Service No.183042. His attestation paper notes that he had previous military service, given as "5th Notts. &

Derby", so, at some point back in England, Samuel had served in the Army; this time he was joining the Canadian Over-Seas Expeditionary Force. Other details recorded on his attestation include:

Height: 5ft. 10ins. Place of Birth: Horsley Woodhouse, England

Complexion: Fair Religion: Church of England

Eyes: Blue Next of Kin: Lillian Florence Wheatley

Hair: Dark Address of above: 212, Burn Block, 9th Avenue, Calgary

Trade or Calling: Brewer

Samuel was pronounced "Medically Fit for Service". He would then, presumably, have undergone a degree of training before being "shipped to France" as 183042 Private Samuel Wheatley of the 7th Battalion Canadian Infantry (British Columbia Regiment).

I do not have details as to when Sam arrived in France but the 7th Battalion Canadian Infantry were active throughout the war. If Sam was in France sometime in 1916, he may have seen action during the Battle of the Somme (July-Nov 1916). By early 1917, after the failure of the Somme offensive, the Allies were laying plans for the next major attack. There had been changes, General Joffre, blamed for French "unpreparedness" at Verdun in 1916, was relieved of his operational command, his replacement was General Robert Nivelle. As Commander-in-Chief of the French Army, Nivelle and his British counterpart, General Douglas Haig began to formulate plans for a combined offensive aimed at a major breach of the German lines early in 1917. Nivelle asked the British to take over more of the front in France in order to release French troops for an ambitious offensive in the Champagne region. To help ensure a major French breakthrough, a British diversionary offensive was considered necessary, the town of Arras, located in the British zone, was to be the focus of this element of the plan. Arras had been in British and French hands since 1915, to the north lay the "whaleback feature" of Vimy Ridge with its commanding view of the plain of Douai; in 1917, the Germans held this high value strategic position.

The Arras offensive was planned by General Allenby, commanding British Third Army. His initial strategy called for an intense 48 hour artillery bombardment following which the infantry would deliver a powerful thrust along the sector incorporating supporting infantry divisions to "leapfrog" through the central assault and push on deep into enemy lines. Elements of the plan were controversial and, amongst other things, the intense artillery barrage was lengthened to 4 days and finally 5. Then, in March 1917, the Germans made a significant



withdrawal to the formidable Hindenburg line, spoiling the British planning. Allenby's plan involved the British First and Third armies, the

Canadian Memorial, Vimy Ridge

German fall-back meant that the right flank of Third Army now faced an exceptionally strong section of the Hindenburg line. The plan was changed, the infantry attack would now go in on the 8th April (this was later re-scheduled for the 9th April). British Third Army was centred on Arras, to safeguard its northern flank it was vital to take and hold Vimy Ridge; this task was given to the four Canadian divisions of First Army reinforced by the 13th (British) Brigade and the 24th (British) Division. The 7th Battalion Canadian Infantry (1st British Columbia) formed part of the 1st Canadian Division, the southern most of the four Canadian Divisions facing Vimy Ridge. So it was that Private Samuel Wheatley found himself in the Arras/ Vimy Ridge vicinity as First and Third armies prepared for the offensive, he would have heard the intensifying British Barrage as the fateful 9th April approached.

Sam did not to see the attack, records show that he was killed on the 8th April 1917, the day before the opening of the British offensive at Arras. The day was Easter Sunday when, despite the numerous religious services held in and behind the lines, the war rumbled on. Although I do not have confirmation, one of the more likely causes of Sam's death was German artillery fire. Despite the British bombardment the German artillery had not been subdued and there are many accounts of the effects of German shelling prior to and on the 8th April. The author and poet Edward Thomas was also at Arras and was knocked off his feet by a German shell (that did not explode) on the 8th April , (sadly he was hit and killed

by another shell the following day).

Sam is buried in Arras Road (CWG) Cemetery, Roclincourt, the cemetery is on the west side of the N17 road from Arras to Lens some 4 miles north of Arras and to the north of Roclincourt. The cemetery was begun, originally, by the Canadians shortly after the 9th April 1917. Up until November 1918, it contained only the graves of 71 officers and men of the 7th Canadian Infantry Battalion (British Columbia Regiment) one of whom of course, was Samuel Wheatley. The cemetery was enlarged in 1926-29 and it now commemorates over 1,000 casualties of the 1914-18 war; the original graves are now at the back of the cemetery close to the Cross of Sacrifice. Old dug-outs exist under the NE corner and to the SW boundary of the cemetery.

Sam's wife Lillian continued to live in Calgary and it is known that, at some point, probably in the 1940's, she ran the "Wheatley Hospital" there (no longer standing). Lillian never re-married and she and Sam did not have children. Lillian died in 1971, aged 85, her grave incorporates Sam's Death Plaque.

Sam is commemorated on the "Smalley Boys" memorial, the memorial plaque in Horsley Woodhouse Parish Church and the Methodist Chapel

and in the British Legion Memorial Hall on Main Street, but not on the village memorial. The lad who handled pit ponies in our local mines, the man who joined the Notts & Derby, who emigrated to Canada, married and settled there before meeting his destiny with the Canadian Infantry at Vimy Ridge, certainly did his duty to the full. It is here that I would pose a question: although it is not the purpose of these articles to campaign or lobby, as we approach the 100th anniversary of Samuel Wheatley's death, is it not time to consider adding his name to our main war memorial?, he became a resident of Calgary, Canada, but is surely still, after all, no less a son of Horsley Woodhouse.

County Councillor Kevin Buttery – Keeping you Updated

Amber Valley Borough Council has withdrawn its Core Strategy (Local Plan). The reason being that Housing Developers contacted the Council within days of the re-convened Planning Inspector Hearings, to state they had reduced the number of houses they were able to build over the next five years. This meant that the target of building 1010 house per year over the next five years could not be achieved. Amber Valley Borough Council therefore had no choice but to withdraw the Plan.

Please note that Amber Valley already has in the region of 5,000 approved planning applications to service its housing needs.

To achieve the required numbers of houses to be built, over the next five years, will be a challenge. Councils do not build houses; they merely facilitate the planning process. Whereas developers own the land, decide when they want to build on that land and at what pace. As we all know, supply and demand dictates the pace of house building. Developers won't build houses to leave them lying empty.

It will inevitably mean that houses will be built in areas that we would prefer them not to be. However, planning regulations still apply so it will not be a free for all as some people are concerned about.

Amber Valley Borough Council will shortly be inviting land owners/developers to highlight additional potential sites, as well as confirm, re-affirm or amend their intentions.

The constant rain over the last few weeks has blocked drains, caused flooding and damaged roads and pavements. The Economy, Transport and Environment Department at Derbyshire County Council are the departments which address these problems. They employ over 1,000 staff and have an annual revenue budget of £80 million. The Highways Division itself, maintains 3,280 miles of road, 2,800 miles of footways, 91,200 street lights, 1,080 bridges, 578 mile of retaining walls, 400 traffic signals and 6,900 illuminated street signs.

Can I ask that if you see a blocked road drain, please report it, rather than wait for flooding to occur. Also report any road or pavement defect via the Derbyshire County Council website 'online report a fault form' in the Transport and Road section, or contact myself.

The Highways Department is also responsible for gritting. They tend to pre-treat before bad weather hits, with the priority being A Roads, heavily used B Roads, major bus routes etc. Again, snow information, school closures and tips on how to keep warm are all available on the website. Plus you can check which roads are on gritting routes and when they were last gritted.

Regarding Combined Authorities, please note that the East Midland Devolution Deal, that has yet to be agreed, is now being called the North Midlands Deal.

AVA/2015/1214 - 2 and 3 storey extension to medical centre – Amber Pharmacy Members declared an interest in the above planning application due to the Parish Council being Trustees of part of land the application is based on.

Action on outstanding issues:

Wood Lane – Members had requested that a mirror be installed at the junction of Wood Lane, however Derbyshire County Council have informed members that new traffic mirrors are not allowed in the highway as their presence can be detrimental to maintaining highway safety, as traffic mirrors give a small and often distorted image of approaching traffic. Motorists using them are not easily able to appreciate the closeness or speed of approaching traffic, and the presence of other highway users such as cyclists or pedestrian in the immediate vicinity is rarely acknowledged.

The Parish no longer has a footpath officer, so if you are out and about and see any problems/issues that need reporting please report them to the Parish Clerk. Don't think someone else will as they may not.
