

A proposal for a more sustainable Local Bus Service has been submitted to the Bus Service Improvement Team at Derbyshire County Council. Work is continuing on a more detailed update to the proposal, which is based on a Demand Response Bus Service, fundamentally different to the Fixed Route service which we have all known for decades.

Most of us demand convenience, flexibility and comfort in our travel requirements nowadays, which along with online shopping etc. is resulting in a major decline in bus passenger users. This has meant rural bus services such as ours becoming increasingly unsustainable and as seen recently resulted in reductions in services, mainly affecting those people who do not have a travel choice.

Demand Response Bus Services have been introduced by other councils around the country with some success, but needs the willingness of all major stakeholders, being the Council, bus operators and bus passengers to accept change is necessary. One bit of progress is that Derbyshire have appointed a Project Leader to consider the Demand Response Transport needs.

The first of a number of meetings by the wider stakeholder group, to discuss Derbyshire Bus Service Improvement Plans is scheduled for the 30<sup>th</sup> March by which time the local Forum involved in the consultation should have submitted the update to the proposal. ## Local Clubs, Community Groups & Societies

### Horsley Woodhouse & Smalley Royal British Legion

Continuing the story of village servicemen who came safely home from the 1939-45 war and lived out their lives in Horsley Woodhouse, we remember Henry Ling.

It must be remembered that all these are based on anecdotal accounts of events

passed on by the subject, usually in the convivial surroundings of the Jolly Colliers and for some reason on a Thursday night when the ex-service men seemed to gather and reminisce of those days when the nation was fighting for its very existence.

Henry told me that on the day when he returned home and announced that he had joined the Royal Navy he received a stinging slap round the ear from his father. He said this with a twinkle in his eye, but one gathered, his Dad was not well pleased. Reporting to Portsmouth he was initiated into the art of slinging your hammock, amidst much hilarity he finally succeeded and spent a surprisingly comfortable first night in the Senior Service.

He served on several ships but on the day of the event which follows, he was on a destroyer as part of the Mediterranean fleet escorting a convoy of merchantmen heading for the besieged island of Malta. They had been under constant air attacks soon after leaving Gibraltar. At this point the reader should note that soon after hostilities broke out, the German cargo ship Altmarck (which was being used as a prison ship for Allied seamen, mainly British men who had been picked up by the roaming German pocket battleships after sinking their ships in the North Atlantic and transferred at sea to the Altmarck), was intercepted by the British destroyer Cossack and the prisoners released.

The skipper was one Captain Vian and was a big boost for propaganda which cheered the nation up, also it helped Vian's promotion prospects as you will see.

Back to the Mediterranean and a sister ship of Henry's was hit by a Stuka dive bomber and began to list; at this point Henry said we were stunned to hear, "stop engines, stand by to pick up survivors, we would be sitting ducks for the circling Stuka's. Nets over the stern and all available hands to pull in survivors". Henry said this big brawny stoker was next to me and grabbed this oil coated survivor shouting, "come on my bonny lad lets have you on board". The oil coated figure said "I'm not your bonny lad I'm Rear Admiral Vian. The stoker said, "I nearly threw the B\*\*\*\*\* back".

Henry went on to have the unique experience of being torpedoed twice in one day, surviving both incidents. He came home safely, worked at Denby Pottery and indulged his passion for gardening, being well known for his beautiful chrysanthemums.

#### Transport Issues

The Derbyshire Connect Access to Health Service. This provides a door-to-door service to heath related appointments e.g. doctors, hospital, dentists etc. All passengers are charged a fare dependent on the mileage travelled but the cost is lower than equivalent taxi fares. This service is operated by Ashbourne Community Transport under contract to the County Council. For more details on the service and to book a journey please call 01335 342 951.

The Derbyshire Connect Weekly shopping bus service. This provides a once-a-week shopping trip from every community in the county including Horsley Woodhouse, to a local town centre and or supermarket to enable people to shop etc. for a couple of hours before returning passengers back to their home. In the Horsley Woodhouse area this service is provided by Derbyshire Community Transport under contract to the County Council. #### Trees and Forestry Management

Derbyshire County Council have bolstered the members of staff within the tree planting team as the season for planting is in full swing. We have a Million Trees officer, who is leading the project to plant a million trees in Derbyshire by 2030. This will help to achieve our target of reducing emissions generated by the county council to net zero by 2032 or sooner. It will also help the rest of Derbyshire reduce carbon emissions generated within the county to net zero by 2050 or sooner.

We have also appointed three tree inspectors to survey, manage and develop the county's tree stock. This includes safety inspections and recommending remedial work. The majority of this work is along the highways, but it also includes rights of way and country parks. The three new officers all have slightly different skills and knowledge sets which will make an excellent team, with a wide experience with Forestry England, an ecological consultancy as an arboriculturist/ecologist and the final member has 25 years' experience in arboriculture.

We have a further officer who is responsible for the management and restoration of woodlands throughout Derbyshire in response to ash dieback - a serious fungal disease affecting ash trees of all ages and now widespread in the UK. This officer is also leading on bringing our woodland estate back into active management and has a background in forestry which initially focussed on monitoring and managing invasive non-native tree pests and diseases, before moving into the management of small, sensitive woodland sites.

#### **Environment Matters**

Did you know grants of up to £1,500 are available to help Derbyshire residents retrain and learn new skills suited to low carbon technology? More than 60 Derbyshire residents have already benefitted from our Green Entrepreneurs Scholarship Scheme including a plumber and heating engineer from Chesterfield applied for a grant and was awarded £1,250 to cover the cost of two courses to learn how to safely install heat pumps.

#### **Potholes**

The winter period is always our busiest time for pothole repairs due to the 'freeze thaw' weather conditions which damage the road surface. **Our latest figures show that we repaired 2,820 potholes in the week beginning 19<sup>th</sup> February 2023 and a total of repairs completed since January this year is 19,660.** 

Most pothole repairs are reported to DCC by the Highway Inspectors who patrol the County Highways. The frequency of our inspections depends on the traffic volume. For example, 'A' roads are checked on a monthly basis, smaller rural roads on an annual basis. That does not stop you reporting Potholes or highways defects either direct to me or inputting them on the portal on DCCs website www.derbyshire.gov.uk/home.aspx and press the 'report a road fault' tab.

## **"RAMBLING" THROUGH TIME** (A serialised alternative history of Horsley Woodhouse)

PART 11. The Bethel Chapel and the Methodist Church

Hello again, as we start our next Ramble from exactly the same place as the last one, using our imagination, look to the left of where the Club Row used to stand. Cast your eyes to the left of the

building and imagine a pathway or "jitty", as these small footpaths between buildings etc. were known. This one led to fields at the back of the Club Row, passing near a wood yard on its way to a Primitive Methodist Chapel, known as The Bethel Chapel. It would be situated approximately where the entrance to Meadow Close is now. You will notice on the photo the date stone above the door. This stone was saved and now features on the Millennium Wall for posterity. Children went to weekly Temperance Meetings. There was "a Scribe" and a "Worthy Arcon" and other officials. These characters were all children and were watched over by an adult. There were prayers and a meeting where the Worthy Arcon was the chairperson and order was called by banging a small hammer on the desk. The



more confident individuals would perform "contributions" which consisted of suitable songs, poems or short stories etc. Importantly The Pledge was signed to declare total abstinence from the demon alcohol! Cast iron will power must have been vital to resist the temptations of the four pubs in the village, all within easy walking distance! Intemperance was generally discouraged, maybe where the old saying "moderation in all things" originated?

Let's retrace our footsteps back onto Main Street again and turn right. A few yards on the right stands the Village Store, it has been a general store for many years, but in its early days it was an early form of a Chemist's. Large bottles filled with brightly coloured liquid were displayed in the window and inside there were banks of wooden drawers containing all manner of pills and potions to hopefully cure ills. A little further down on the left we see the Jolly Colliers. When mentioned in the previous Rambles it was one of the four village pubs, but in recent years it has been converted into dwellings. We stay on the left and arrive at the fine, brick constructed Methodist Church. If we step back in time to the planning and construction of this building in the mid 1800's, we are reintroduced to more of the familiar hard times in our Village and beyond - the "Hungry Forties". Many were unemployed due to the lack of jobs which was the knock-on effect of the Potato Famine in Ireland and the unpopular Corn Laws. There was little or no help. Consequently, there were serious financial problems for many. Are we now seeing history repeating itself as we are again in the throes of discontent, rising prices, taxation, hardship and poverty. Is there a strange sense of Déjà vu in all of this? There was the impact of increased prices as the Church rate was increased from £4/annum to £17.19.1/2d/annum. A tythe was imposed upon the people of Horsley Woodhouse by the Vicar of Horsley, which was appealed against and lost. The villagers had to annually pay the following monies - for every fleece of wool twopence ha'penny, every cow and calf

twopence ha'penny, every mare and foal 4d, every messuage house 8d, every cottage 7d, every hive of bees 2d, three eggs for a cockerel, two eggs for a hen, three eggs for a drake and two eggs for a duck. Geese and pigs among other things were also chargeable. The Vicar must have been a busy, but well fed individual. As a result of these frugal times there were many riots in the county, although there were none recorded in our Village.

Despite these years of extreme poverty, the Central Methodist Church was built and opened on September 24<sup>th</sup>, 1848. Fifty odd years later in 1904 the Sunday School building was erected next door as a fine extension to the original building. Over the years this building has been used for many occasions including local stage presentations, the seasonal fundraising events for the Methodists, and until recently it has accommodated the Pre-School Play Group. This practically sized building has a lovely traditional feel about it and provides an excellent venue for the Methodist Café Church and the seasonal fundraising functions. There is always a superb welcome at these events from the warmhearted organisers who work so hard to provide a close and supportive community spirit to all who attend these friendly village events.



Before we draw this Ramble to a close, attention must be drawn to another, this time unlikely place of worship. If we quickly turn right by Peony (Far Fairfield), which is a little further down Main Street and walk approximately 20 yards and look to the right, we see a small white cottage. It stands proud at the end of a row of houses. This used to be yet another Chapel. It hasn't been used as such in living memory, so nothing is known about it. It is now a house.

Let's meet for our next Ramble back on the Main Road at the British Legion. Meanwhile enjoy the beginning of the long- awaited warmer Spring weather.

## **Arthur Medical Centre**

Primary Care (including GP Practices) has continued to experience far greater levels of patient demand for appointments than at this time last year. Arthur Medical Centre is no exception and has experienced a noticeable increase in patient contact and requests for appointments. The result of such high levels of patient demand obviously has an impact on GP appointments and subsequently there are currently times when it is difficult to get a GP appointment. This is further impacted by factors such as staff sickness absence at a time when locum staff are in high demand and subsequently short supply.

The practice team work very hard indeed to accommodate as many patient requests as we safely can in each working day. When appointments for the day are full, and we cannot safely conduct further numbers of appointments, we will refer you to NHS 111. NHS 111 are equipped to assess your needs and direct you to the right place to get appropriate care and help, therefore for the sake of your wellbeing, please do refer to them if you are asked to do so.

In many instances, a GP appointment is not always the best solution for illnesses. Often another solution, such as a referral to a pharmacist or a First Contact Physiotherapist is a more appropriate route for you to get the right care for your problem. If the Practice team offers a referral to another appropriate service, please do accept this.

#### **Practice Statistics**

As of 1<sup>st</sup> March, Arthur Medical Centre has **9,081 patients registered with the Practice.** This is an increase of 71 patients since the same point last year. Over the month of February 2023, Arthur Medical Centre has:

- handled 4,805 incoming telephone calls (an average of 240 calls handled per working day). This compares to 4,133 calls over the same period last year an increase of 16.25%
- provided **3,819 patient appointments** in total (an average of 191 per working day)
- Of these appointments, **2,093 were face-to-face appointments** (an average of 105 per working day and around 53% of the total)

**122** patients did not attend their appointments and did not give notice of cancellation, which would have allowed us to offer these appointments to other patients who needed to access a clinician. This represents up to **30 hours of patient contact time across the month.** 

Practice appointments are a precious resource especially given current pressures and patients can be frustrated when trying to book GP and Nurse appointments. Please help us to help you and others by notifying the practice if you are unable to attend your appointment to allow us to offer the time to other patients.

All the staff at Arthur Medical Centre strive to deliver an exceptional level of care to each and every patient, and we do so within the parameters of available resources and funding. If you have feedback or a complaint regarding your experience as a patient of the Practice please submit this in writing for the attention of the Practice Manager. If you have feedback or a complaint regarding national policies related to Primary Care or NHS services these may be best raised with your MP.

Thank you for your ongoing support whilst we hope to continue offering the best care possible.

### **Richardson's School Foundation**

In 1712 John & Samuel Richardson established the Foundation to provide a schoolhouse, pay a schoolmaster, and make quarterly payments to pupils to attend the school.

The Richardson brothers, in 1712 conveyed to William Woolley and others, a dwelling in Horsley Woodhouse and several closes of land, on trust that William Woolley would, in return, purchase a piece of land and build a schoolhouse. A yearly salary of £10 would be paid to a schoolmaster for



teaching 12 poor boys to read, write and cast accounts (arithmetic). The boys would receive 8d (3.5p) each per week, paid quarterly, for every week they attended school. The residue of the rental income from the conveyed property would be divided as follows: one third to the schoolmaster and two thirds amongst the 12 poor scholars. Seven of these poor scholars were to be from Smalley and the other five from Heanor and Horsley Woodhouse.



A schoolhouse and dwelling house (for the schoolmaster) under the same roof was built in 1721. The scholars at this time received 9d (4p) per week for books and clothes.

New trustees were appointed in 1826 and John Radford Jnr. was appointed actuary. By this time the rental income had increased, and the schoolmaster was paid an annual salary of £35, of which £6 was for teaching a Sunday School. Attending the Sunday

School were 16 boys from Smalley, seven from Heanor and five from Horsley Woodhouse.

Over time the Foundation has evolved and the property from which it derived its income has been sold. The money raised from the sale is invested and today the income from these investments provides the Foundation's resources.

Over the years the Foundation's scope and remit has been fashioned and ordered first by the Ministry for Education and in more recent times by the Charity Commissioners. The Foundation now provides an annual grant to the Richardson Foundation School in Smalley and also awards grants to students from Smalley and Horsley Woodhouse going on to Higher Education.

The Foundation is administered by a board of Governors representing the various areas covered by the Foundation.




Happy Founders Day and Thinking Day! Every year on 22<sup>nd</sup> February we

### **Changes to Voting**

From 4<sup>th</sup> May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections. This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections. For more info

If you don't have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

You **will NOT** be able to vote in the May elections unless you take photo ID to the Polling Station.

You can use the following as proof:

- A Passport
- A Driving Licence
- A Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Identity Card proof of age & defence
