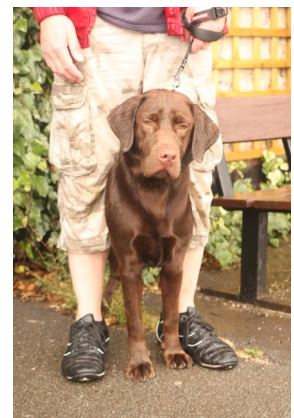

Horsley Woodhouse Walking Group



The Walking for Health Group is now in its fourth year. It has a walk every week of the year except Christmas week. Each week the numbers vary from about 20 to 30 walkers. The walks cover most of the area covered by the Arthur Medical Centre. These walks vary in length with some for the less able walkers, but include a more challenging walk (up to 3.5 miles) once a month.



At the end of June our walk started from Morley Rectory. From the car park we headed out to Brackley Gate.

Some of the fields had fine crops of corn growing in them, but the paths were very good. Part way down Moor Lane we used the path through the woods near Drum Hill. It was very pleasant under the trees as it was very warm and sunny. This brought us out on to the golf course at Breadsall Priory. After following the yellow marker posts across the greens we came out at the Breadsall Alms houses. Here we used a path through a field of broad beans. The beans were shoulder high but the path was good. This took us back to the main road at Morley Hall and the Rectory. Most of the walk was on footpaths. The group all enjoyed this more challenging walk, and an excellent lunch was provided at the Rectory afterwards.



In September on Wed 19th the walk is part of the Amber Valley Footprints Walking

Festival. This year the walk is a heritage walk round Horsley Woodhouse and Horsley, taking in some of the Historic sites around the area. It is 3.5 miles or 2.5 miles if you want a shorter walk. The walk starts from the Church Hall at 9.45 am and refreshments are provided afterwards.

‘We Will Remember Them’

**Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen who have no known grave:
Sapper Sidney Daniels, 172nd Tunnelling Company, Royal Engineers, WW1**

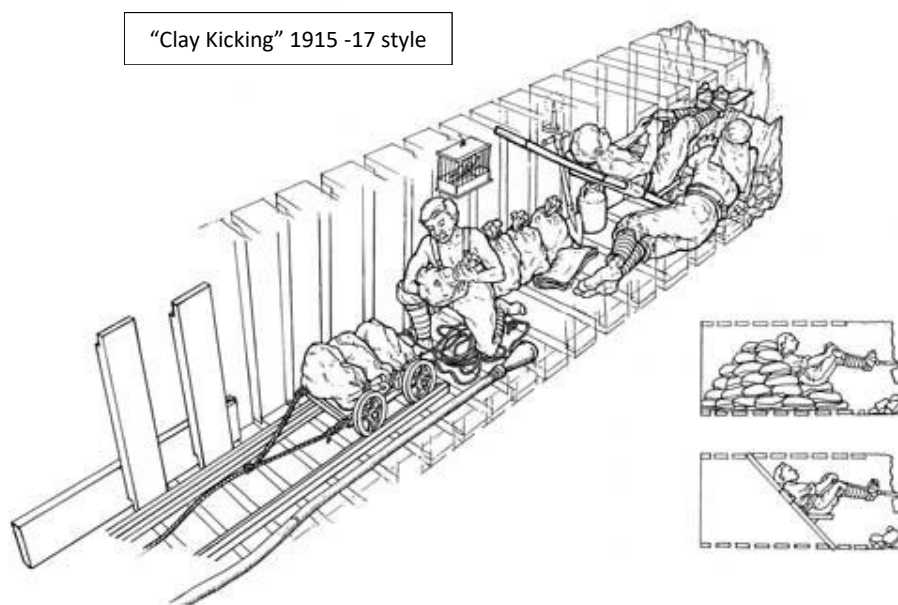
Sidney Daniels, related to our late Branch Chairman (also Sidney Daniels), was the husband of Miriam Daniels, the couple being resident at Brown’s Lane, Holbrook at the time of World War 1.

Enlisting in the Royal Engineers with the rank of Sapper, service No. 112826, records show that, almost certainly due to his mining related skills, Sidney went on to serve in France with one of the first of the specially formed tunnelling companies.

Background: Tunnelling Companies

By November 1914, the war of movement on the Western Front had been replaced by the “wearing out” battles of trench warfare. Both sides began to think of ways by which they might break through each other’s lines and end the stalemate. Under such circumstances it is perhaps not surprising, that an ancient siege breaking method was revived, namely the art of mining under enemy lines, placing explosives and literally “blowing them up”.

On the 20th December 1914, the Germans blew 10 relatively small mines under the British positions at Givenchy. An infantry attack followed on the heels of the explosions and some 800 men of the Indian Corps were lost. As a consequence, the commanding officer of IV Corps of the British Army, Sir Henry Rawlinson, asked as to the possibility of forming a special battalion dedicated to mining activities. The request was taken up by Lord Kitchener who, in turn, approached Major John Norton Griffiths, a colourful figure who had much experience of tunnelling and mining projects both in the UK (London Underground, Liverpool and Manchester sewer systems) and abroad in South Africa. Norton Griffiths was particularly familiar with the tunnelling technique known as “clay kicking” or “working on the cross”, a method best suited to clay soils. To operate the method men sat in the tunnel under construction with their backs supported on a cross shaped wooden frame, their feet pointing at the working face. They used a light spade type tool to dig out the clay in front of



them which a tunnel “mate” then passed back for disposal. Norton Griffiths knew that the technique would be ideal for the clay soils of the Western Front and persuaded the army hierarchy to let him recruit some “moles” as the diggers called themselves, to try things out in “France”. The need for special units was acknowledged and the first Tunnelling Companies were formed; these were designated 170 to 178 and consisted of five officers and 269 men per company. Each unit was commanded by regular Royal Engineers taken from existing Field Companies.

So began the British mining efforts of World War 1. The tunnelling companies worked in France and Belgium in 1915, 16 and 17, notably at Loos (in the Hohenzollern Redoubt after the 1915 Battle), Hill 60 near Ypres, the Somme in 1916, Vimy Ridge (also 1916) and perhaps most famously on the Messines Ridge in 1917 where 19 mines were detonated at the opening of the successful British attack planned by General Plumer. Three other mines were placed on the ridge, one of these was discovered and lost to the Germans, one exploded in the middle of a field in 1955 during a thunderstorm and one remains in place to this day, exact whereabouts to be determined!

It could take up to a year to dig a tunnel and place a mine. As well as driving their own tunnels, the "clay kickers" and supporting workers had to listen out for enemy counter tunnelling. On a number of occasions miners accidentally dug through into the opposing side's tunnel and underground fights broke out as a result. Different skills were developed to discover enemy tunnelling, early methods included driving a stick into the ground and holding the end between the teeth to pick up/feel any underground vibrations or sinking a water filled oil drum into the floor of the trench, lowering your ear into the water and listening for enhanced tunnelling noises. Mine charges became bigger and bigger. On the Somme, two of the British mines comprised 24 tons of ammonal explosive producing huge craters. At Spanbroekmolen (Ypres Salient, Belgium) a large British mine left a blast crater measuring 430 feet across, this crater is still in existence today housing the 40 foot deep lake known as the "Pool of Peace".

Sapper Sid Daniels served with 172nd Tunnelling Company and was killed on the 16th October 1915, aged 29. He is one of the missing, his body never being identified or recovered. He is commemorated on panels 4 & 5 of the Loos Memorial to the missing incorporated in the CWGC cemetery at Dud Corner, Loos-en-Gohelle, France. He may have been killed during tunnelling in the Loos area after the main battle of Loos (no mines were used in the battle but the Hohenzollern Redoubt was certainly tunnelled and mined by both sides after the battle), a time consistent with his recorded date of death. Alternatively Sidney may have been killed above ground during an attack or by artillery or sniper fire.

Tunnellers were a "breed apart", when asked about the kind of men being used for tunnelling and mining, one RE Officer commented:

"Everybody damns the Tunneller; GHQ because he invariably has his job finished months before the rest of the Army are ready for the attack; Army troops because he invariably upsets all their preconceived notions as to the safety of trenches and dugouts; Divisional troops damn him because he is outside their sphere of influence; Brigade troops because he refuses to move when they do and because he knows by heart that part of the line to which they come as strangers; Brass hats because they dislike his underground habits; Regimental officers because he refuses to allow them to use his deep and snug dugouts; Subalterns because of his superior knowledge; Tommy because he is the direct cause of numerous extra fatigues and-alas that it should be so-because of his extra pay; and last and loudest, the Boche damn him because of his earnest and unceasing attempts at uplifting and converting them into surprised angels. It is also owing to his success in this noble work of the missionary that the Tunneller is highly respected by all branches of the force".

I'm sure Sid Daniels would have identified with this!

Dud Corner Cemetery and the Loos Memorial to the Missing

Situated just N.W. of Loos, the cemetery takes its name from the large number of "dud" (un-exploded) shells found in the vicinity after the 1918 Armistice. The Memorial to the Missing is incorporated within the cemetery in the form of 139 panels built into the walls, it records the names of 20,589 officers and men who fell during or just after the 1915 Battle of Loos and on the Lys, Estaires and Bethune fronts of spring 1918 with no known grave.

Public Participation:

- Complaints were received from members of the public regarding the overgrown grass verges along Dobholes Lane and Wood Lane. Parish Clerk to ask DCC to cut back the verge on Dobholes Lane, and ask A Shaw to cut back the overhanging foliage along Wood Lane.
- Cllr E Lancashire reported that the hedge at the corner of the Church Hall requires cutting back. Parish Clerk to inform A Shaw.
- Glyn Wilton offered his services to help with ideas for commemorations for WW1.

Recreation Matters – Sitwell Recreation Ground

Cllr Lancashire reported that a number of properties on Church Lane have broken through to make an access on to the Recreation Ground. Parish Clerk to write to residents who have broken through the hedge into the Recreation Ground requesting that the hedge is reinstated. If however, this is not carried out within an appropriate timescale the Parish Council will fence the area.

Samuel Richardson School Foundation - eligibility for foundation grants

The Charity was established in 1712 by John and Samuel Richardson of Smalley. Income was used to provide a schoolmaster's salary to educate 29 'poor scholars' - 16 from Smalley, eight from Heanor and five from Horsley Woodhouse. Income at the time was derived from rents from farms in Kilburn and Horsley Woodhouse.

Over time the charity has evolved and now still provides a small grant to the Richardson Primary School and grants to school leavers going onto higher education. Horsley Woodhouse is represented on the charity by Cllr Eric Lancashire, and the Chairman of Governors is Peter White.
