Workforce Update

Dr Sarah Hedgethorne is relocating and is therefore unfortunately leaving her role at Arthur Medical Centre in April. Dr Hedgethorne has been an important part of our team, both as a registrar doctor and a member of our permanent GP team and whilst she will be missed by colleagues and patients, we wish her the very best for her future career. Unfortunately, we must also share that a member of our Practice Nursing team, **Angela**, is also leaving the Practice for another opportunity. Angela has proven to be an excellent nurse and offered us support during a very difficult period, through the pandemic and its impact on our nursing resource. Angela will also be missed by all our team and our patients, and we wish her all the very best.

I am pleased to confirm however that **Dr Megan Foreman** will be joining the Practice in June. Dr Foreman has worked at our practice in the past as a registrar doctor and we are delighted that she is coming to join us as part of our permanent GP team.

I am also pleased to confirm that we have completed recruitment for the anticipated gap in our nursing resource. Two Practice Nurses will join the Practice in May which also represents an increase in our nursing hours and an increase in patient-facing appointments. We will share details of our appointees in our next update.

Patient Services

As shared in our last update, many practices across the country reduced or suspended non-essential patient services to support the vaccination and booster programmes, in accordance with directions from the Government and NHS England.

Arthur Medical Centre maintained our usual levels of patient services and access throughout the booster campaign, although some non-essential services, such as minor surgery and ear syringing were curtailed or suspended or provided elsewhere like contraception. Now that the booster campaign is largely completed, we are now gradually reintroducing these services at our practice over the next two months. There are waiting lists for certain services which we will begin to work our way through as we begin to reintroduce these areas of work. We would therefore ask for your patience and understanding for any apparent delay whilst we address the outstanding work.

Winter access and increased appointments

Following the impact of the pandemic and vaccination campaigns, Primary Care and General Practice has been under a great deal of pressure both from a backlog of work and from increased patient demand. This has been reported widely in the media and great efforts have been made to satisfy patient demand and improve accessibility to Primary Care services.

With the support of the local Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), Arthur Medical Centre has provided an additional **574 GP appointments** over and above our usual level of services from the period of January to the end of March. The majority of these additional appointments were face-to-face appointments. Most of this

provision has been achieved with locum resources at significant cost. However, our focus has been on improving accessibility and responding to increased demand during the winter, which is always a very busy period in any year. We are delighted to have been able to provide this additional resource to our patients during our busy winter period but will be falling back to more normal provision from April.

Practice Statistics

I

As of end of Feb 2022, Arthur Medical Centre's patient list totals **9,005 patients** - an increase of 114 patients since the same point in 2020.

Over the month of February, Arthur Medical Centre has:

- handled 4,078 incoming telephone calls (an average of 204 calls handled per working day)
- provided **4100 patient appointments** in total (an average of 205 per working day)
- Of these appointments, 1,817 were face-to-face appointments (an average of 91 per working day)
- 68 patients did not attend their appointments and did not give notice of cancellation, which would

have allowed us to offer these appointments to other patients who needed to access a clinician. This represents **17 hours of** clinical time across the month.

Meetings of Horsley Woodhouse Parish Council – February and March 2022

February

The Policing Safer Neighbourhood Team in Heanor have advised they will attempt to attend some Parish Council meetings and want to hear about any concerns people may have.

All parties involved in the email correspondence chain between Horsley Woodhouse Parish Council and Derbyshire County Council have agreed the **emails regarding the request to lower the speed limits within the village can be made public via the HW Parish Council website**

<u>www.horsleywoodhouseparishcouncil.org.uk/</u>. For many years speeding in the village has been raised as an issue with the Parish Council. We have been trying, with no success, to make the village safer by having the 30mph speed limit on Church Lane reinstated and making the 20mph speed limit by the school permanent. There have been many accidents in both these locations so it is likely that reducing the speed limit will have a significant safety benefit. The correspondence available on the HWPC website shows the current status but we are still pursuing making the village safer.

March

Cllr Ainsworth informed he has an upcoming meeting to discuss the programming of the signals at Four Lanes End in Horsley Woodhouse which can cause a backup of traffic particularly in the morning and early evenings. He also confirmed the parts needed to fix the flashing slow down speed sign on Church Lane are obsolete, but an alternative solution is already in discussions.

Cllr Ainsworth confirmed the garden waste bin collection service is now running and all the details for this year's collections are on the Amber Valley Borough Council website <u>www.ambervalley.gov.uk/rubbish-waste-and-recycling/garden-waste/</u>. The link to this information has also been added to the HWPC website.

The Horsley Woodhouse Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7.30pm on Tuesday 3rd May at the

"RAMBLING" Through Time (A serialised alternative history of Horsley Woodhouse) Part 6. Main Street to the School

Here we are at the start of Main Street. Let's see what we can discover. On our right opposite the Church is the building which used to be the old Co-op. If we look at the early photograph, and compare it with nowadays, the building can still be recognised by its access arch to the rear which is now a car park for the residents of the flats into which the shop has now been converted. The Ripley Co-operative Society opened this Horsley

Woodhouse Branch in 1896. Inside there were two main

counters and a cold slab for bacon, meat, cheese and butter. Goods were lifted up to two other floors with a rope winch. The Co-op remained the main shop in the Village for many years until local shopping declined and it closed in 1974. Another food shop took it on but was short lived, as was the Electrical Wholesales storage which it then became, until of course the conversion into flats. When the Co-op was dismantled, some of the fixtures and fittings were given to Derby Museum and were passed on to The Beamish Open Air Museum for use in a display depicting an old Co-op Shop of the period. *(Photographs and information circa the closure in 1974 is courtesy of The Wudhus News July 2007).*

Opposite the Old Co-op and adjacent to the Church is a residence which occupies its private space behind gates encompassing a front yard and outbuildings. This used to be the Dr's House and Surgery complete with a Dispensary, this has now been superbly replaced by The Arthur Medical Centre at the western edge of the Village. The original residence remains and is privately occupied.

Diagonally opposite the old Dr's Surgery stands the Old Post Office.

As we are now so close to the "New School", let's pause a while and consider the lives and times of our Village children some 100 or so years ago, in health and at play and compare their lifestyles with the youngsters of today. Their schooldays will come later.

In days gone by family holidays and day excursions were rare luxuries and lived long in the memories of those who were



lucky enough to enjoy them. A lot of the children's clothing was sewn and repaired by Mothers who also did a lot of the knitting for the family. Darning socks (unheard of today) was a regular necessity because "make do and mend" was a vital part of the household economy in these hard times. The girls would learn the skills and lend a hand as soon as they were old enough. These well- worn and mended clothing "hand me downs" were passed on down through the ages of the children and were also a necessity for the family finances in most cases. Dads went to work (many down the local pits) and also kept the family fed by tending a productive garden to supplement the

diet of the household. Family life was so different in those days with the near absence of cars and no television, social media, computers, the leisure industry or the hospitality industry. Most of the time was devoted to the unrelenting upkeep of house, home and family, with Church or Chapel on a Sunday with a few Village events throughout the year.

The children's play tended to be seasonal and made the most of what was available. The old saying "Necessity is the Mother of Invention" couldn't have been more apt. The following are just a few of the fun times which, by and large were all outdoors. Snow, although it was a hardship to everyday life brought great excitement for the children. Shoes and boots were made temporarily water resistant by painting a layer of fat around the soles. Presumably this would be before the availability of Wellies. Snowballing, sledging and the building of snowmen became the order of the day. The "Resser" (a small reservoir a short way down Fairfield Road) was a favourite meeting place in the biting cold weather. Slides were made across its frozen surface and sledging took place down its banks. In the less inclement weather the girls would have a long rope across the road and play skipping games. If there was any traffic there was plenty of warning, as its approach would usually be heralded by the clatter of a horse drawn vehicle of the day plus an audible verbal warning if necessary. Another set of fine weather games were Shuttlecock and Battledores (yes, played with a feather shuttlecock and bats which roughly resembled modern day badminton racquets). Whips and Tops were played with where the top had string wound around it and was sent spinning away by "whipping" the string away. There were also many assorted ball games. The boys played Marbles and swapped and collected "Fag" cards, scrounged from their parents in the days when smoking wasn't frowned upon. These collections were replaced some years later by the collecting of informative sets of cards on many subjects given away free in packets of loose leaf tea, (a somewhat healthier option).

In the autumn the fruit of the Horse Chestnut trees matured and fell to the ground to be plundered by eager children hoping to find the finest specimens to make ready for the start of the Conker Season. Some were prepared by soaking in vinegar and were placed in a cool oven to harden them off. A hole was pierced through the centre and then they were threaded with string. There were bruised knuckles aplenty, with the occasional black eye! The Conker Champion was the owner of the specimen which had destroyed the most adversaries. A modern-day Health and Safety "grey area" no doubt! Girls played with dolls and doll's tea sets and boys made stilts from string and tin cans. Long, warm summer days were enjoyed by preparing a pack of sandwiches and walking across the fields to Denby to spend the day catching jam jars full of "tiddlers" from a fast-flowing stream. This activity came to an abrupt halt when the land was out-cropped for coal.

Children who were allowed out after dark used to make holes in tin cans and make a string handle. Hot coals would then be placed in the bottom of the cans and they were swung round to make the coals glow brightly. These were called Winter Warmers, maybe yet another potential modern-day Health and Safety issue! Another occupation reserved for the dark nights was a chasing game around the local streets and footpaths shouting "If tha dunna holler, we shanna foller", (*trans.* If you don't shout, we won't follow). Children were adaptable and independent with regard to their pastimes. (Brightly coloured plastic and computer games hadn't been invented) and in those days improvisation with what was available fed active imaginations and cost very little. The countryside provided a wealth of healthy outdoor play with dens, trees, streams, fields, haymaking etc, providing a natural stage for all manner of daring feats of bravery and re-enactments read about in books and comic strips. All of this as well as bird and animal spotting and the excitement of the first Snowdrop, Catkins and Pussy willow which heralded the start of spring. Any indoor weather provided the opportunity to play board games, snakes and ladders, draughts etc, playing cards and colouring books and of course reading. The word "bored" wasn't a part of the vocabulary of these children.

Most childhood "ills" were hopefully intercepted at home with an assortment of old fashioned "stand bys", which promoted the "prevention is better than cure" adage. Brimstone and Treacle was administered (usually on a Friday evening). It was reputed to keep toilet visits of good quality and regularity. For more persistent cases, Syrup of Figs was the preferred choice. Virol was a malty tasting concoction containing bone marrow. Eggs and lemon syrup were also part of this sweet and sticky supplement. It was promoted with the slogan "Children grow strong on Virol". No doubt the sugar content of this spoonful a day marvel was an attractive prospect for the little ones. The ubiquitous but mysteriously named "Emulsion" has been re-profiled in more modern times as Cod Liver Oil. The oil was emulsified to make it more digestible for the unfortunate recipients than straight Cod Liver Oil. It contained vitamins A and D, vital for bones and teeth. Especially important in the days when rickets was a common cause of pain, poor growth and deformities of the bones. Another preventative potion was Parish's Food, this was an iron supplement and was given in conjunction with Virol and Emulsion. This would perhaps be a valuable aid to nutrition in harder times. Snow fire was rubbed onto chilblains. It was a waxy, green, solid product which was made of natural emollients and soothing and healing herbs and spices. No wonder it was needed in the days of leaky footwear and chilly houses where usually only one room was heated. The easily remembered Blue Bag (a product dipped into laundry rinsing water to improve the appearance of white washing) for bee stings and vinegar for vasp (an aide memoir not a mistake!) stings were a trusted relief and antidote for acidic bee

stings and alkaline wasp stings. The dock leaves were sought for rubbing onto the keen sting of the nettle to neutralise the tingles and raised rash.. Herbal Rue tea was kept in the cupboard for stomach ills and Goose Grease was rubbed into ailing chests. The local anaesthetic property of Clove oil was dabbed onto aching teeth in the hope of postponing a visit to the dreaded dentist! An apple was a valuable aid to cleaning teeth, no doubt often picked fresh and quickly rubbed and eaten with the assurance that it hadn't been sprayed with any suspect chemical compounds. Remember, an apple a day kept the Doctor away!



The children got mucky and had their fair share of bumps, bruises and scratches, did their share of jobs to help out at home, played hard and went to bed early. Together with good home cooked, preservative free food, the sometimes unpalatable dietary supplements and their freedom in the great outdoors by and large gave the children a happy and uncomplicated start to life in their formative years. They developed a knowledge and respect for the countryside which surrounded them. They also encountered periods of national and local hardship which although difficult, those times were character forming and stood the children in good stead for future life and enhanced a strong community and family spirit.

Although we haven't travelled far down Main Street, there has been a lot to tell. As we hear the echoes of children at play both past and present, we arrive at the gates of the "New School", but this is another story for next time.

An update from Louise Heaton:

The Bier mentioned by Sheila Cullen in her lovely "Rambling" Through Time (Part 5) article in Wudhus News Feb/March 2022, was renovated by the late Simon Harrison some years ago at his own expense, which included the cost of sending the cast iron under-carriage and wheels away to specialists for restoration.



If I remember correctly from a conversation with Simon at the

time of the photograph in 2016, it was originally made in memory of Lilian Crooks, of Horsley Woodhouse, whose coffin was the first to be carried on it when she died in 1923, aged 51.

Sadly, but perhaps most fittingly, the first time it was used after restoration was for Simon's own funeral in November 2017.

In Memory of Ronald (Ron) Harrison 25th April 1927 to 20th January 2022

Ron was born in Horsley Woodhouse on April 25th 1927 and first went to Horsley Woodhouse School then to Smalley Boys, but he did not enjoy school, especially the later stages when the boys spent their time 'digging for victory' in the school garden.

He left school in 1941 and worked in the former Chevening factory in Horsley Woodhouse, better known later as North's bus garage, which was taken over for dismantling Rolls Royce Merlin aircraft engines and the parts cleaned and inspected to be used to make the Meteor, which was the tank engine version of the Merlin. George Marshall's timber yard and workshops were also taken over for this and Ron then worked there.



Ron was called up in September 1945. Being disappointed there were no vacancies in the RAF, he was sent into the Royal Marines. He became a small arms armourer, serving at Plymouth, Portsmouth, on Dartmoor and in North Wales. He was also sent to Cuxhaven in Germany. After being demobbed in 1948, he first worked at the Midland General bus garage at Langley Mill, but soon returned to work at Horsley Woodhouse on the Merlin engines.

In 1949, Ron started doing motor repairs at home and shortly bought an Austin 20 Limousine and ran a taxi service.

Ron got married in 1951 to Joyce Riley and they lived at first in a caravan. Ron then soon realised he needed some bigger premises for the car repair business. In 1953, George Marshall retired from the timber yard and the whole premises, including the house known as Church View and the workshops came up for auction. Dad attended the sale and was the highest bidder, but this did not reach the reserve, but George and Dad were old friends and they later agreed on a price. Ron and Joyce moved the caravan adjacent to the workshops and lived in it there. The rest of the family moved into Church View.

Ron and Joyce's first child Simon was born in 1955. They later bought The Gables, the house at the bottom of the lane leading to the garage. Their second son Martyn was born in 1959, followed by Harvey in 1963. Meanwhile, I had left school and started working with Ron in the garage in 1962.

Brian Kelf started coming to do bodywork at evenings and weekends in 1966 and this was the start of a big change. Bodywork started to form a large part of the operation, and nowadays the site is run by Brian and known as B A Kelf Bodyworks and continues to be very busy.

In 1970, Ron started a private pilot's course and made his first solo flight in 1971. Over a period of eighteen years, he completed over 450 hours of flying.

In 1989 Ron and Joyce had a bungalow built and moved in there with their eldest son Simon. Joyce died in 2009, and shortly after that Ron decided to take a plumbing course at the age of 82 and completed it successfully.

Simon sadly passed away in 2017, so Ron was left living on his own, but continued to lead an active life into his nineties. He was a well respected gentleman and will be sadly missed.




Wow I know I don't look old enough! But thanks to our DC for handing me my 30-year service this month.


