

Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated

This year marks the 130th year of Derbyshire County Council, which was celebrated by a small ceremony at County Hall. As you can imagine, the way we deliver our services has changed and evolved through the years, with greater use of technology and constant new challenges being faced every day.

Just as a snapshot, the council:

- Maintains 3,500 miles of road and pavements
- Helps 13,500 older and disabled people to live independently at home
- Support 20,000 carers to look after family and friends
- Helps 416 schools to offer the best education
- Runs 21 children centres
- And provides foster homes or residential care for 770 children

Since 2010, Derbyshire County Council has achieved a total of £257m worth of savings, but still has to save a further £63m to balance the books over the next five years. The council will therefore need to use around £40m from reserves to minimise the impact upon residents.

It was welcome news when the Chancellor announced in his Spending Review there would be additional funding for special education needs and social care for both adults and children, which means we could receive an extra £15-£20m to meet these challenges.

Just a reminder that parents of Year 6 primary children have until midnight on Thursday 31st October 2019 to apply for next year's secondary school places. Applications can be made online via Derbyshire County Council's website or by telephone 01629 533190. Parents have a legal right to list three schools in order of preference, which should include their 'normal area' school as one of the preferences, but they do not have an automatic right to a place at any particular school.

Having been contacted by the Local Government Boundary Commission, which highlighted a number of imbalances due to the distribution of population and electoral representation, with Horsley Woodhouse being specifically mentioned, Amber **Valley Borough Council is** seeking your views on holding elections for Borough Councillors once every four years, as against by thirds. This could save the Council £140k over a four year period. Details of advantages and disadvantages are highlighted

on the council's website, please submit any comments to elections@ambervalley.gov.uk by the 18th October 2019, or by writing to the Executive Director (Resources).

As previously highlighted, Amber Valley Borough Council has now introduced new powers to tackle irresponsible dog owners in the area via the introduction of a Public Spaces Protection Order. This Order requires any person in charge of a dog to immediately remove any dog faeces from public areas and show they have a suitable bag in their possession to clean it up. I have raised my concern at issuing children with a fixed penalty ticket for £100 for being unable to produce a poo bag. All income from such fines will go into the council's general fund.

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"Missing"

Two Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen, Two World Wars

Part One – The Western Front, WW1:

It is late 1917 on the Western Front of WW1, after more than three years of fighting the protagonists take stock. For the British Army the year has not gone well, their three main offensives at Arras (9th April to 16th May), Ypres ("Passchendaele" end of July to mid-November) and Cambrai (20th November to 6th December) have not achieved a breakthrough. Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig wants to continue attacking, but his armies have sustained heavy casualties and reinforcements are not forthcoming due to "political intervention". No further attacks can be contemplated, defence is the "order of the day". A review of the situation with Britain's allies brings little comfort. The Belgian Army is merely clinging on to a tiny corner of territory, after the disastrous Nivelle Offensive in April, the French Army has mutinied and will now only man the trenches, it will not undertake attacks. Russia has a revolution on her hands and will soon drop out; the USA entered the war in the spring, but progress of her troops to the front has been slow and the corresponding impact minimal. Elsewhere, Italy had fought Austria-Hungary along its northern border, including the Alps and along the Isonzo river. She has sustained heavy losses and is now in need of help - the British are obliged to respond. Other than the small corner held by Belgium, the British and French man the lines on the Western Front from the Belgian coast to Switzerland.

The Germans are in a much better position. Their numbers on the Western Front are about to be swelled by an influx of troops returning from the Eastern Front following the Russian collapse, and four divisions returning from Italy. As 1918 comes into sight, they have the prospect of a period of several months with the advantage of superior numbers of troops over the Allies. They are, however, well-aware that the opportunity will disappear once the Americans arrive in force. In theory, the Germans have options on how best to proceed, in practice, the decision is already made – Germany will mount a major offensive on the Western Front. The German command knows that the attack needs to be made as soon as possible after winter. Late February/early March 1918 is the

target time, leaving only the question of where to attack? After considering possibilities, the influential General Erich von Ludendorff decides to attack the British front at the point where it meets the French held lines near the German-held town of St Quentin, he adds an extension to the north taking the attack towards Arras. Ludendorff's intention is to break the British lines, turn northward and continue attacking until the British are either destroyed or pushed completely back to the Channel.

Then, in what will turn out to be a highly significant request, the French ask the British to take over a further section of the Western Front, a move that extends the British lines 25 miles further south; the British agree. As 1918 arrives, the British take over additional sectors north and south of St Quentin. At this point the BEF holds 126 miles of front. These changes mean that the German Offensive, the "Kaiserschlacht", will now fall on two British Armies, one third of the attack will hit the British 3rd

Army to the north and two thirds will strike the British 5th Army to the south. The offensive is finally scheduled to open on the 21st March. It is against this

backdrop of events that we come to the central character of this narrative.

The British 24th Division are part of Fifth Army; at this point of the war due to casualties and lack of reinforcements, the three brigades of the British Army Division have been reduced from four, to three battalions each. In the case of the 24th Division one of its three brigades is the 17th and the 3rd Battalion Rifle Brigade is one of its three current battalions. Serving in the 3rd Battalion, Rifle Brigade is one Thomas Marshall of the village of Horsley Woodhouse, Derbyshire. Thomas had joined up in 1914 as a Private, by now he is "battle hardened", his battalion having fought at Ypres and on the

Somme in 1916, followed by Vimy Ridge, Messines, Passchendaele and Cambrai in 1917. Somewhere along the way he has been promoted to Corporal and as such is now in charge of a section of a dozen or so men. As thoughts turned in his mind standing in his battalion's current positions NW of St Quentin, his wedding to Ada (Shunburne) back in December 1914, must have seemed a lifetime ago.

The vicinity in which Tom now finds himself is uninspiring with few features of any note. The area to the rear of the British lines is desolate, the Germans having laid waste to it during their wholesale retreat to the Hindenburg Line in early 1917. Villages are now just rubble with only painted signs giving their names; bridges and rail lines have been destroyed, wells collapsed or poisoned, trees cut down, no sign of life, inhabitants gone. The only new things poking up from the battered land are the lines of telegraph poles installed by the army. Closer to the front, cellars within the ruins are used as accommodation – further back hutted camps have been built near to village ruins for use of units coming out of the line.

Times have certainly changed, ingrained tiredness touches all but the new arrivals to the front. The former team spirit is still there to some extent, but the closeness has gone, too many casualties, faces absent; the "old sweats" are more guarded, cautious, they are resigned to being there, trying to see it through; at 26, Tom is no exception. The changes extend to the nature and layout of the British positions. The front line has become the forward edge of what is now called the Forward Zone which, in effect, is not much more than an outpost line and by no means continuous. Then, two to three thousand yards behind the Forward Zone are the main defences of the Battle Zone, designed to hold off strong enemy attacks penetrating the Forward Zone. Further back still there should have been a third "Corps Line" defence, but this has barely been started in the St Quentin sector. As an experienced soldier, Tom is probably generally aware of the shortage of men in this part of the front. Despite efforts to dig all down the 25-mile stretch, the lack of manpower means that the defences are not complete. In many cases the Forward Zone consists of scattered outposts that have to cover the ground between with machine gun fire. There are a number of "all-round" redoubts behind the Forward Zone (but in front of the Battle Zone) each of which would, effectively, have to fight on its own in any sustained German attack. Should a strong enemy attack push on past the outposts and redoubts, it follows that the Front Line & Forward Zone would be lost unless counter attacks could be launched from the Battle Zone. The soldiers in this sector, Thomas Marshall included, are probably unaware that British defensive plans do not include such counter attacks.

As January turns to February and the weeks wear on, rumours begin to circulate of a possible German attack on the Western Front. By early March, RFC observations report increased levels of German road and rail movements and a build up of German ammunitions dumps over consecutive nights. Then, in mid-March, reports come in of the appearance of significant excavations in No Man's Land (as it turned out, these are to provide shelter for the German assault/storm infantry). British Intelligence predicts a German offensive in late March on the British lines between Arras and St. Quentin. Word filters down to the men of the British units on the Arras – St Quentin front

that an attack is coming, when the British artillery begin to bombard areas behind the German lines after mid-March, the reality of such an attack becomes clear, but not all of the details are known. The German attack will actually extend south of St Quentin, meaning that, whilst British 3rd Army will be engaged to the north, the whole of 5th Army will also be embroiled to the south. As the 21st March approaches, in the British trenches at night, when the wind is "right", British soldiers of the 3rd and 5th Armies can hear the sound of German trains and transports bringing troops up to the front.



Eventually, 76 German Divisions are in place, poised and ready to launch a massive assault in three waves along a 60-mile attack front; storm

troops form the spearhead of the assault. As Thomas Marshall and the men of 3rd Battalion Rifle Brigade "stand to" before dawn on the morning of the 20th March 1918, they do so on the eve of the largest attack of the entire war......

You have 42 days from when the notice was posted on 7th September 2019 to comment.



New Prescription Medicines Order Line - UPDATE

As from 15th July, there is a new telephone number for you to request your repeat prescription - **Tel. 0115 855 0260. The lines are open weekdays 9:00 am to 4:00 pm.** It will no longer be possible for you to order your prescriptions by phoning the old number.

We are aware that a few patients have experienced some difficulties during the transition process; however, the CCG team have now worked hard to reduce these issues. We strongly recommend that you avoid Mondays due to high demand, and the lines are less busy in the afternoons than the morning.

Flu Vaccination Clinics 2019/2020

Flu clinics will commence early October with appointments available in clinics held on Saturday mornings and various weekday times for patients eligible for an NHS flu vaccination. The initial clinics will be for the over 65 year olds. There will be clinics starting late October and November for the under 18's and under 65's (as that is when we will receive our supply of vaccines for that age group).

Again this year three different types of flu vaccine will be used in the flu programme. This will benefit patients by ensuring that they have the most suitable vaccine that gives them the best protection against flu.

The three vaccines are:

- A 'live' nasal Flu Vaccine for the 2 18 year olds
- A 'Quadrivalent' (4 strain) vaccine for the 18 64 year olds
- An 'adjuvanted' flu vaccine for over 65 year olds/age 65 before 31st March 2020 which gives better protection against flu in this age group

Due to the different types of flu vaccines this year the receptionist may ask the age of the patient when booking the appointment to ensure they receive the appropriate vaccine.

Usually influenza activity does not increase from baseline levels in the UK until December; though it can be earlier. Therefore, vaccines given in early November are likely to be 'in time' for the flu season.

Text message invites will be sent out once we have confirmed delivery dates for supplies.


