Horsley Woodhouse & Smalley Royal British Legion



The branch continues to meet on the first Monday of each month unless it is a Bank Holiday.

How much longer we can continue is debateable. Membership is falling mainly due to the passing of our older veterans, and we are struggling to fill the officers essential for our survival. Sadly, if the branch closes the village will lose the Memorial Hall which is still used by several of our village organisations. The deeds of the Legion property are held by H.Q. in London and almost certainly they would sell the area off once planning consent had been obtained. **If anyone would like to help us to prevent closure then they could become Legion members, anyone can join the Legion, you do not need to have served in the Armed Services.** It's simple to join, easiest way is to ring 0800 3077 773, have your debit or credit card to hand, stipulate Horsley Woodhouse branch, No. BR 0038 and its done. You can also join online or request a form but by phone it is quick and easy.

Continuing the series of village men who served in 1939-45 and came safely home, this time we feature Doug Bacon. Doug was called to the colours in 1941 and was taken into the Cheshire Regiment. He was a natural leader and progressed to the rank of Company Sergeant Major (CSM) to the uninitiated a remarkable achievement for an enlisted man, usually only regular soldiers would aspire to that level.

The regiment served in various parts of the UK including the Shetlands, Barnard Castle and Folkestone. The latter would indicate they were scheduled for Germany, but the end of hostilities cancelled this out. The Shetlands were part of the UK's Northern defence line, particularly anti-aircraft gunners keeping the naval base at Scapa Flow protected against Luftwaffe aircraft based in Norway; it must have been a hard environment to be stationed in during the winter months. I was fortunate enough to have a long

conversation with Doug. One night at a chapel function he told me how they kept up morale among the men on those long freezing winter nights, no mean feat when the war was going against us in 1942-3.

Back in civvy street Doug became foreman and then manager at Salterwood (Street Lane) progressing on to manager at Waingroves, Ambergate and Salterwood. He moved to Waingroves and became area manager for Butterley Brick. He was a pillar of strength at Horsley Woodhouse Methodist Church, always a natural leader, fondly remembered to this day by all who knew him.

It gives me great delight to say a big thank you to Horsley Woodhouse and the ‘Getting to Know You Café’ for their kind gift of funds to our craft group. The craft group started off many years ago in the Church Hall at Smalley, and later at Horsley Woodhouse. A few members (myself included) came up to the café for a cup of tea and a chat. We are a non-profit making activity and try to just cover the cost of the rent of the building. We are very grateful to the British Legion and especially Don Barham. Our members come from Woodhouse, Smalley, Kilburn, Coxbench, Morley and even Watnall.

Adding to Joan’s kind words, the Horsley Woodhouse Community Association (HWCA) would also like to thank the ‘Getting to Know You Café’ for their extremely kind donation towards the HW Carnival this year. It is such a shame that the Café will no longer continue to provide a warm and friendly space for the people of Wudhus. However, we can assure the community and the founders of the Café (Wendy, Karen and Sheila) that the funding provided will help support the purchase of new gazebos to keep people dry in the rain and enable shade in the heat. Here’s hoping it’s not as hot as last year’s carnival but fingers crossed the rain will stay away!

“RAMBLING” THROUGH TIME

(A serialised alternative history of Horsley Woodhouse)

Part 12. The British Legion to Hollies Farm

Here we are at the start of another Ramble, by this time the main flush of spring will be past and we will be approaching early summer. Another episode of our modern history will again have been consigned to memory with the celebrations marking the Coronation of King Charles 111 and his Queen Consort Camilla on 6th May.



We meet at the British Legion building, having on our way passed by a large dwelling called Willow Grove, where a Dr and his staff lived and worked during the time of need for a British Legion building in the village. The local branch of the Legion was formed during WW1. At that time there were no permanent premises in which to hold meetings, so these were held in one of the local pubs. After the end of WW2 enough cash was raised for the purchase of the pre-fabricated building which still exists today. The land was purchased from a nurse from Willow Grove. A small row of adjacent

cottages had already been demolished, together with the clearing of the adjoining area which was previously used as the main Merlin Engine dismantling plant. This is how the British Legion and its car park were eventually accommodated in the Village. In 1961 the seat to the front of the building was presented by the School to mark 100 years of education in the village. An additional point of interest is that the bricks from the long cellar which ran the length of the demolished terrace of cottages were re-used to build an air raid shelter on Stainsby Avenue. This in turn was also demolished at the end of the War and the bricks were again re-used to build a garden shed at number 6. Nothing went to waste in those days!



Let's cross back over the road again and pay a visit to the Millennium Wall. It occupies a central position in the village between the old Hollies Farm on one side and the Post Office/house on the other. The Post office has been closed in recent years and is now a private residence. The Millennium Wall site was cleared and then constructed with stone saved from the refurbishment of the Church Hall. The stone was stored and then sorted and the choice



pieces were used to construct the Wall and its various displays. Two of the Gothic style window arches were also kept and re-constructed and the Bethel Chapel stone was also permanently displayed above a stone seat. Interestingly, the stone wall which remains behind the Bethel Chapel stone was originally the end wall of a row of cottages and a coloured tile hearth was discovered during the restoration building and construction. (We never know what lurks beneath the ground we now stand on). There is also a forged metal sculpture on the wall which commemorates the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1. This depicts a Spitfire, Poppies, Soldiers and Barbed Wire. A fitting memorial to all who fought, were lost or wounded or worked so hard for the War Effort.

If we now walk a few steps to the end of the Wall, we see Hollies Farm Drive. This is the site of the old Hollies Farmhouse and buildings, which were demolished and replaced with a small housing estate in more recent

years. Just inside the entrance to the farm was the Old Tannery building which housed one of the oldest of the Village trades and a source of employment. The history is somewhat sketchy as it dates back such a long way and as previously mentioned all traces were lost when the site was cleared for the housing estate.

What we do know is that the Richardson family (a local notable family) ran the business in the 17th century. Bark from oak trees was used in the tanning process, which in those days was plentiful as Horsley Woodhouse and the surrounding area was well wooded. Horse drawn drays used to arrive with the logs for the tanning. The drivers often stayed overnight and the story goes that fights often used break out in the Jolly Colliers! Most of the transportation and delivery of the hides took place overnight too as the stench was unbearable! As time went by, the business was moved to St Peter's Street in Derby and then in the next century to the Eagle Leather Works. It was later moved again in the 1940's to a 20acre site near the railway in Normanton. There is a reduced version of this business still in existence in Derby, but it is now trading as a Curriers, which is the dressing and preparation of hides after the tanning process has been completed.

The last piece of history to mention in this section of the Ramble is the building attached to the front of the Tannery. This diminutive brick-built structure played its own important part in WW2 as the Village Fire Station. It was equipped with buckets of sand and buckets with stirrup pumps and was manned by volunteers. Among these volunteers were village miners. Again, a huge debt of gratitude must be bestowed on these loyal and intrepid men who kept the War Effort going in so many vitally important ways. After the War, this unlikely small building provided modest accommodation for people, as there was a shortage of homes. In later times it became vacant and fell into dilapidation.

We will resume our next Ramble when we meet again in the Autumn, a few yards further on at "Cross End" where we will talk about some of our old Village traditions and Tradespeople. In the meantime, we wish you a restful and enjoyable Summer Break.

Introducing the Care Navigation Team

Over recent months, Arthur Medical Centre has been engaged in various efforts to review our processes and services and is committed to an ethos of continual improvement. We have recently completed an initial review of patient accessibility and identified areas for improvement in some of our internal processes.

One outcome related to the work carried out by our Reception Team in the practice. As the landscape of Primary Care has changed over recent years, the role of a practice reception team has expanded beyond answering of telephones and booking appointments. NHS Primary Care has developed to include additional routes for patients to receive the most appropriate care, such as referrals to NHS 111, Urgent Treatment Centres and Community Pharmacies – all of which require an increased level of awareness, knowledge and skill. We have therefore re-designated this important patient-facing team to now become our Care Navigation Team as this is more reflective of the work that they now do. Our Care Navigators are here to help you and are trained to direct you to the most appropriate route for your individual needs. Please help us to help you and others by accepting the appointment or referral given by the Care Navigation Team.

Long Term Conditions Reviews

Arthur Medical Centre has recently improved the way we organise our annual reviews for patients with long term condition, such as Asthma, Heart Disease, Diabetes etc. From this year, patients will be invited to make an appointment for their annual review around the time of their birthday. You will receive a communication from the practice asking you to arrange an appointment with our Care Navigation team. There may be times where appointments are not readily available at a suitable time due to the levels of demand currently on the practice, therefore please be patient and try and book an appointment when you can. Your regular medicines will continue to be prescribed until the time of your annual review.

DNA (Did Not Attend)

Over the month of April, 114 patients did not attend their appointments and did not give notice of cancellation, which would have allowed us to offer these appointments to other patients who needed to access a clinician. This represents up to 28 & ½ hours of patient contact time across the month. On one morning, 5 patients did not attend their appointments with our Mental Health Worker in the practice, wasting 3 & 1.2 hours of appointments which could have been given to other patients. Practice appointments are a precious resource, please help us to help you and others by notifying the practice if you are unable to attend your appointment to allow us to offer the time to other patients.

Registrar GPs

Arthur Medical Centre is proud to be a training practice, supporting the development and training of future Primary Care GPs. GP Registrars are assigned to training practices for a period of placement and are rotated round a variety of practices and hospital departments to give them a broad experience of the NHS. Dr Sophie Bell and Dr Rehab Ali have just completed their placement and have now moved to other practices. Dr Waheed Tufail will remain at the practice, and Dr Bahaa Kasem and Dr Mohamed Omar have newly joined the practice as Registrar GPs.

Practice Statistics

As of 1st May, Arthur Medical Centre has 9,087 patients registered with the Practice.

Over the month of April, Arthur Medical Centre has:

- handled 4,232 incoming telephone calls (an average of 235 calls handled per working day). This compares to 3,674 calls over the same period last year – an increase of 15%.

- provided 3,302 patient appointments in total (an average of 183 per working day)

Of these appointments, 1,946 were face-to-face appointments (an average of 108 per working day and around 59% of the total).

Patient Feedback Meeting

As part of our work to improve our accessibility and communications, **we are planning to host an open online meeting in June via Zoom**, where patients of the Practice may attend and receive some insight into the running of the practice. Patients will be welcome to ask general questions related to the services offered by the Practice, to members of the Partnership and Practice Management team and to our Patient Participation Group (PPG). Dates for this meeting will be confirmed and will be advertised on the Practice Website at <https://www.arthurmedicalcentre.co.uk/> in the near future.

Samuel Richardson's - Charity for Poor Colliers

Samuel Richardson (1641—1719) of Smalley Hall left £400 to be invested in land and property, the income from which was to be divided equally to 10 "poor disabled" colliers of Smalley, Horsley Woodhouse, Mapperley and Heanor. Samuel Richardson's will was proved at Lichfield in 1719 and the Charity was founded.

A farmhouse in Horsley Woodhouse - Burnhurst Farm - together with outbuildings, orchard, garden, croft and six fields were purchased for this purpose. The property was sold in 1877 and the money invested. Burnhurst farm is now known as Hurst Farm. The Radford family, heirs to the Richardson's, faithfully administered the charity until the beginning of the 20th century, when the Charitable Trusts Acts and the Local Government Act of 1894 necessitated the formation of a committee of at least four representative persons to perform this duty.

In 1901 income from the investment totalled £77-5s-8d which was divided between fifteen "poor disabled", or elderly colliers, each receiving £1-5s-0d per quarter (the number of recipients having been raised from ten to fifteen in 1880 following the sale of Burnhurst Farm). The Clerk's wage at the time was £2 per annum and the remaining balance paid the bank charges.

The Charity is registered with the Charity Commissioners under the Charities Act 1960, registration number 213980. The income is derived from income shares held in the name of the Official Custodian for Charities. These income shares were purchased from the proceeds of the sale of Burnhurst Farm. In recent years the trust has been administered by Trustees appointed by the Governors of the Richardson School Foundation. The sum received by each retired miner is paid annually in January. With the closure of mines in this area it is becoming more difficult, as time passes, to find retired miners who qualify for the payments.

Keeping the villages connected.... Kilburn and Holbrook

Kilburn Village Parish - Speed Indicator Device (SID)

Kilburn Parish Council are proud that we were the first village in Derbyshire to apply and obtain a Speed Indicator Device, you may have seen it already situated in our village.

July 2022 Kilburn Parish Council created a community led plan questionnaire; speeding came back as the top priority under question "what would be your policing priorities". Also, village speeding comments were heavily common throughout that questionnaire.

When the opportunity arose for Derbyshire Parish Councils to apply to have a SID along with grant funding available through Derbyshire PCC. Kilburn Parish Council acted quickly; they knew that this would be an ideal way to help tackle village speeding awareness whilst also collecting valuable data and insights into speeding trends to pass onto Derbyshire Highways and Derbyshire Police.

The Questionnaire responses along with the work and support of Kilburn Parish Council and Community Speedwatch helped strengthen the application for a licence and applying to obtaining a funding grant. It was a lengthy process and took nearly a year's work to complete. During that time Kilburn Parish Council are grateful for the help and advice that they received from: Derbyshire Highways, Richard Handbury, Cllr Trevor Ainsworth, grant funding from Derbyshire Police Commissioner and to the residents of Kilburn who took time in completing the questionnaire.

SID positions and data:

Rykned Road is where the SID is currently positioned, this road is notorious for reported speeding, accidents and animals being run over, it was decided that this would be the first position. The SID is **multi directional**, it can be turned to indicate traffic speed in both directions. When the Parish Council has collated data in both directions on this road, it will be published in the village newsletter. At present there are five licenced locations (sites where there are speeding issues) where the SID will be positioned in the village.

Kilburn Parish Council hope that the SID will have a positive impact on reducing speeding in our village now and for years to come.

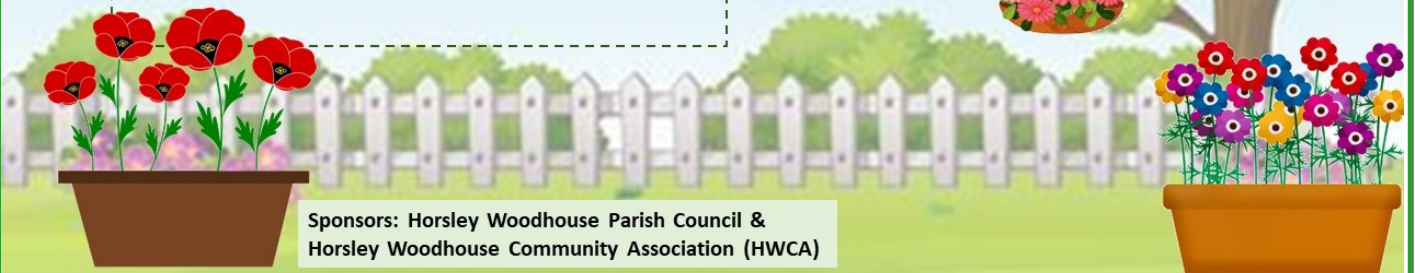
