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## **Community Pride**

Horsley Woodhouse is a very nice place to live and there are many who wish to keep it that way, so that we can all enjoy the village. Unfortunately, there are a small number of individuals who may not see their activities can be anti-social and affect others. So, what are the types of things that cause others upset and help reduce the quality and pride in our village:



- Leaving rubbish bins out on the pavement for several days after they are emptied blocking pavements
- Parking too far over on the pavements so footpath users struggle to get through (especially with buggies and mobility scooters)
- Throwing litter on the ground
- Parking on grass verges which turns them into mud traps
- Not picking up dog foul on footpaths and recreation grounds

If you are a little frustrated with some of these anti-social activities then why not support your community and take a step to helping others. You might say, "well it won't make a different, so why bother', because it will.

#### What can you do to help?

- Pick up litter and pop it in a bin if it is outside your home or when you are out for a walk
- Join in the community clean and litter pick (see overleaf)
- Sweep the pavement and clear the weeds outside you house once or twice a year (if you are capable). We don't suggest putting weed killer down as this may harm animals.

You may be thinking that is what we pay our taxes for so why should I be picking litter up and pulling weeds out. It's simple, local councils have a limited amount of money and resources, and unfortunately these are very stretched. Services like street cleaning and grass verge maintenance are not priority services anymore, so if we all did a little to help, we could make a big difference.

#### What's going on already to help the village?

It not all so downbeat though, as we already have people in the village who are active and do their bit to help:

- Thank you to the volunteers who plant and keep the flower beds and tubs looking lovely throughout the year.
- Those who join in the village street scene competition, tending their gardens and baskets and dressing their house fronts in July





with bunting and scarecrows. Also, at Christmas with decorations and displays.

- Villagers who already pick litter up, and the occasional dog foul from dogs that are not their own!
- The Parish Council who keep both recreation grounds looking tidy with hedge cutting and regular maintenance on the play equipment.
- Residents' groups who put on activities to enhance community pride and spirit.

If you don't want to wait until the community litter pick in June, and you wish to undertake litter picking as part of your regular permitted outdoor activities then we can supply the equipment to do so during April.

#### We will be providing the following equipment:



- gloves
- litter pickers
- high vis vests
- bin bags and holders



Equipment will be dropped off at people's homes and the bags of litter can be taken home and placed in your own green bin or left at the designated sites - Horeston and Sitwell Recreation Grounds, where Amber Valley BC will be asked to take away.

#### You are encouraged to comply with all Covid-19 restrictions in place at the time of activity:

- Individuals (households) who wish to help pick up litter can as part of their walk and permitted 'daily outside exercise'
- Take all measures to keep 2 metres apart from any others you may come into contact with
- No individuals (households) will be encouraged to link up with others whilst restrictions are in place
- Keep to footpaths and designated public rights of way only to ensure safety at all times

## **Horsley Woodhouse and Smalley Royal British**

The Branch remains in lockdown unable to arrange any meetings or to discuss future action to be taken to either continue as an independent branch or close down. Should closure occur, all memberships will continue if the member so desires, probably being transferred to a neighbouring branch.

Meanwhile we have been able to assist one of our many friends in Holland (the Dutch and the Belgians) remember the sacrifice the British and Americans made to liberate them from the German occupation. The request came from a supporter of the Airborne Museum at Overloon via Smalley School.

It was funnelled down to myself by the office manager and was a request for a photograph of Roy Abbott a Smalley lad who lost his life on the ill-fated 'Operation Market Garden'; the British and American airborne drop to secure the bridges at Nijmegen and Arnhem in 1944. This is well documented by several books and the film, A Bridge Too Far.



Roy was a dispatcher on board a
Dakota flown by FLT. LT. Jimmy
Edwards (later to become well
known for his TV appearances and
his 'Handle Bar' moustache.
Having made their drop of
supplies and ammo to the
surrounded British Paras at the
Arnhem Bridge, they were jumped
by a German fighter on the way
back. The unarmed Dakota had no
chance against the cannons and
machine guns of the Focke Wulf

and with an engine on fire Jimmy ordered everyone to get out. On leaving his seat he found the three army dispatchers lying on the floor

obviously wounded. Both Jimmy and his co-pilot returned to their seats and managed to put the stricken aircraft down in a wooded area near Overloon. The two RAF men exited the burning D.C.3 through the roof hatch and ran into the trees. The fighter came in and machined gunned the wreck then left the area.

Dutch civilians found the two and hid them until the Guards armoured column reached the

vicinity and they were back in British hands. FLT. LT. Jimmy Edwards was awarded the D.F.C. for his brave actions, and his co-pilot a D.F.M. Sadly, the three soldiers all died in the crash.

Thanks to Brian Abbott we were able to supply the school with Roy's photo and also one of his Mother at his grave side in Holland shortly after the war ended. The Dutch family who tended the three R.A.S.C. men's graves came over to Smalley and stayed with the Abbotts.

We Will Remember Them.

## Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated

Despite no longer owning or having any responsibility for Greenwich Park at Ripley, Amber Valley Borough Council (AVBC) has agreed to pay £5,000 Plan. I also requested that all towards a Feasibility Study for the owners, Ripley Town Council. I have objected to this and requested that this decision is scrutinised.

AVBC now publishes daily, on the home page of the Council's website, the streets it has missed for waste and recycling collection. Recent published figures state the cost of delivering the service this financial year has increased by another £500,000, making next year's cost £4.1 million. It cost £2.6m in 2019.

According to the Local Plan timetable, the sites to be included in the Plan should have been determined in March and sent out for public consultation in April. No sign yet. I welcome the recent Government changes, in which Amber Valley no longer has to take any of the 2,375 houses on behalf of Derby City. The City are now legally responsible for their own housing need, albeit the Council still has a duty to cooperate. Based on the fact that Amber Valley only has to find sites to deliver 7,125 homes and

apparently has a 5-year housing supply, I have requested that Cinderhill and other sites locally, should be taken out of the Local Greenbelt sites be removed from the Council's 'call for sites' list.

The Electoral Commission has determined that the number of elected members at AVBC should be reduced from 45 to 42. Consultation will be undertaken in respect of the shape of Wards, which I expect to follow existing parish boundaries. If you wish to have your say on where you think the Ward boundaries should be, visit www.consultation.lgbce.org.uk the Consultation closes on 3rd

Derbyshire County Council (DCC) has agreed to spend £120m on the county's roads over the next three years. The investment will be aimed at resurfacing roads and pavements, improvements to drains and 46 road safety schemes. The work will be undertaken by DCC staff, specialist contractors and will involve recruitment of an additional team of workers.

Across Derbyshire, there has been 59,000 residents and nonresidents, who have undertaken Covid-19 community testing, in which 587 people who showed no symptoms, tested positive. Regular testing does help in reducing the spread of the virus. In respect of Amber Valley, 10,071 took the test with 119 people being found positive. As of 7<sup>th</sup> March, in Derby & Derbyshire, 376,951 people have been vaccinated with the first dose, which places us third highest in the Midlands and is a tremendous achievement by all those involved in its delivery.

I am pleased to support Horsley **Woodhouse Community** Association community clean up events in line with the 'Keep Britain Tidy' campaign, with a £300 grant from my Community Leadership Fund. Litter and fly-tipping cost councils millions of pounds nationally, so it is brilliant to see residents taking pride in their community and working together to help to keep everywhere clean and tidy.

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# The Church Hall and its important role in our Village - Community, Past, Present and Future

(With extracts from a history by the Rev. Peter Lyme, 1961, notes by Miss Ethel Stanton and reminiscences from Geoff Nash)

#### The Past.....from which we learn.

1869. The New School was built; this is the present Church Hall. It was until it's refurbishment in 2000 also known as The Sunday School (and still is on occasions by some of our older residents). A second classroom was built in 1876. (Interestingly the ground was formerly occupied by the Parish Stocks, what a shame these were destroyed!). By 1871 Evensong was taking place each Sunday in the New School, a rare occurrence in



those days in Anglican places of worship. In 1876 the village was constituted as a separate Ecclesiastical Parish and in 1879 the Smalley Curate was inducted as the first Vicar of Horsley Woodhouse.

In 1881 the foundation stone of St Susanna's was laid and the Church as we now know it was consecrated in 1882. The Church Hall building then was used solely as the School and the Sunday School.

In 1885 after an extremely severe winter there was an epidemic of Whooping Cough and 21 deaths occurred, mainly children. In 1897 it was the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria. From 1899 to 1902 the Boer War took place and 30 men from the village volunteered as recruits; Drill commenced in the Church Hall building. In 1913 the present School was built and the Hall building was then essentially used as the Sunday School.

#### 1914 to 1918, the First World War, our village lost 13 men.

From February 1918 until April 1920 the Spanish Flu Pandemic infected 500,000,000 people worldwide with 50,000,000 deaths. It struck in four waves. The control was limited to non-pharmaceutical methods, such as isolation, quarantine, good personal hygiene, disinfectants and limitations for public gatherings. (All eerily similar to COVID-19 pre the vaccination programme!) The following years saw hard times of high unemployment and huge global financial decline.

#### 1939 to 1945, the Second World War, our village lost 6 men.

During the War Years the Church Hall was used as a food store. There were a couple of stones missing in the gable end of the wall facing what is now the Fairfield Road junction and there was no pavement. The local little lads used to stick their arms through and help themselves to handfuls of peanuts, what a treat that must have been in those lean wartime years. They also used to amuse themselves by sliding down the sloping stones down each side of the Bell Tower steps, the deep grooves which can still be seen today were made by the hob nails on their boots. The other version of this tale is that the children sharpened their slate pencils....maybe the grooves are too deep and long for that explanation. The children used to go to Church on a Sunday and then walk down to the Hall for Sunday School.

In the years leading up to the Millennium the Church Hall entered into a peaceful and more predictable phase as the country slowly recovered from the trauma of a World War. The Sunday School continued with its quaint oak benches whose metal hinged back rests metamorphosed to face either way without moving the whole heavy seat. Ingenious but merciless on the nether regions! There were large fireplaces, a motley selection of chairs, tall, painted pine book cupboards and knotty old oak floorboards. The building held tightly onto its history. Plays, Pantos and Concerts were performed in what is now the Sitwell Room. The stage was at the opposite end of the room, which was also much smaller. A tiered auditorium was constructed from pallets so that all could have a good view and a light and sound tower was constructed and perched precariously at the rear to add more drama to the proceedings. Any wrappers and crisp bags from treats munched during the performances fell through the pallets and were found shredded by the resident mice when the run of the show was over and the auditorium duly dismantled! There were three or four seasonal fund raisers run by the Church ladies with stalls of cakes, home sewn goods and crafts, hoop-la, etc., all accompanied with much tea drinking and chatter. These truly were the old fashioned days of which fond memories were made, but as time passed it became increasingly apparent that the Hall was getting very tired and work worn. The building had served the Village's various needs well, since 1869, changes were necessary.

Meetings and discussions were conducted and the Hall was awarded a Lottery Grant in 1999. Work commenced and the new lease of life was no longer a pipe dream, the refurbishment was taking shape. The transformation was completed for an opening ceremony on the evening of Friday 6<sup>th</sup> October 2000.

The Hall re-opened its doors to reveal a brand new, superbly appointed venue which hosted stage productions with a bespoke control tower for sound and lighting, concerts took place, the seasonal fund raisers continued, quizzes were introduced as were beautiful teas and Sequence and Line Dancing lessons. The Church Hall had been re-invented!



#### The Present....live for today.

20 years on and we move to more recent times and the Hall has continued to serve our Community handsomely. The events and hirings have moved with the times and encompass activities for all ages and interests right across our diverse local population. The theatre groups have become more established and there are three who now regularly grace the stage. The Line Dancing which started in 2000 is as well attended as ever and is now accompanied with classes which teach Ballet, Modern, Tap,

Acrobatic and Musical Theatre. There is Yoga and Qigong, Falls Prevention sessions, various craft groups, the ever-popular quizzes and a fortnightly Café, the list is long and ever changing.

Never has the phrase Carpe Diem been more ironic.....New Year 2020 is upon us with a Hall diary bursting with bookings including the historic VE Day plans. Suddenly the rumours of the novel Coronavirus become unsettling. Jokes are told



about its name and the stories of it sweeping across China are being met with a measure of scepticism until the first reported cases hit our shores on 31<sup>st</sup> January. The Hall battles on with hopes being increasingly dashed until the first dreaded lockdown on the 23<sup>rd</sup> March. The doors are closed!

The entire country is plunged into a life of uncertainty, fear and in some sections denial. Our emotions are thrown into a state of flux. We vacillate between fear, disbelief, condemnation, dissension and sometimes resentment and we are horrified by what some see as a restriction of their rights. We enter a phase of panic buying and hoarding, seeing toilet rolls, pasta and the like becoming as rare as hen's teeth! Aggression and greed become a common sight in Supermarkets. Our usual priorities and lifestyles are overturned.

In March 2021 we are in the grip of yet another lockdown and still we hear reports of crowds breaking Covid restrictions, while others continue to stoically obey the rules. We are a divided nation, living in a period of contrasting opinions, attitudes and emotions. Many vent their spleen as "keyboard warriors" on social media, others suffer the rigours of depression and anxiety as they despair about the situation and the uncertain future and some adopt a gung ho spirit, albeit tempered with a generous measure of disillusionment. We have compassion for those who have hit hard times and urgently need to find food banks, something which many of them find hard to accept. We hear of the desperation of the loneliness and isolation, borne to a great extent by older people. A network is established for regular phone calls and meals are delivered where needed. We are grateful for the cheaper rates for telephone calls and the use of social media to make much needed contact with people who we discover often haven't spoken to anyone in days. Businesses and jobs are lost, hardship hits a huge section of society in many ways. We as a nation are unprepared. We regularly hear the words key workers and front-line workers and we begin to appreciate that theirs is not just a job, but a dedicated vocation. We start to see graphic reports of their daily activities which are regularly well beyond the call of duty. We feel immense gratitude.

We learn of the grief and heartache experienced by the families and friends of those lost to the Virus and we are saddened. The media is packed with reports of overstretched emergency services and Intensive Care Units filled to capacity with those fighting for their lives. We send up prayers and clap acknowledgment for the staff from our door steps. It's a desperate way for communities to give thanks. Social distancing, PPE, bubbles, sanitizer, furlough and banana bread become the buzz words as Brexit pales into the background and we sing Happy Birthday as we wash our hands! Closing and re-opening schools promotes heated debate as our children become pawns on an educational and political chessboard. Lessons and Meetings Zoom

around the Web. "When we get back to normal" is a phrase much spoken, but as time passes, we wonder what "normal" will actually be.

Regular statistics of areas, cases and deaths are reported and we are lulled into false hope as the contagion rate reduces, only to find that a few days later the figures have increased, again our hopes are dashed.

We have more time on our hands as the "leisure industry" grinds to a halt. Restaurants, pubs, theatres, indoor exercise and sports facilities, matches and many more venues are closed. All but the essential retail outlets are put on hold. Time is now no longer at a premium, it suddenly lays heavily on some and they are at a loss for entertainment. Boredom and dissatisfaction set in. For others the extra time is a bonus and a blessing. There is time to take notice and appreciate their homes and see their surroundings through fresh eyes and perhaps to learn. Flowers, birds and their song, animals the weather and changing seasons and the beauty which is around us find a soothing and healing place in our hearts. The air is clearer as exhaust fumes are reduced. For some this is a time of reflection and new and simpler values, with time on our hands to pursue long neglected interests and talents. Garden's benefit and cupboards are tidied.

#### The Future.....let hope be our motivation

We contrast hope with humility. Recent events and memories of difficult, levelling and tragic times have

left their mark on all of us. Let us look forward to a time when we are accepting of the changes which will have been thrust upon our Village and the World with a fresh Community Spirit which has been strengthened through extreme adversity. Maybe this is an opportune time to reflect again on the Hall's early history. Instead of reading just stark printed dates and facts, we are now armed with the fresh experience of the contrasting and overwhelming emotions



experienced by all of us in this last year. We are suddenly equipped with the ability to empathise with our predecessors. We have experienced at first-hand the horror of a World-Wide disaster. We have learnt and now let us reflect and spare a thought for those who have gone before us. Our history repeats and comes to life....... the Past from which we learn.

We are also now inviting patients for their second Covid jabs, in the same priority group order as the first wave of vaccinations when we began in January 2021. Again, we will contact you by telephone or SMS message as soon as we are able to invite you for your second Covid jab.

We are only able to help you with enquiries regarding vaccination bookings for our Babington Hospital hub. If you have a query regarding a vaccination that is not organised via our Babington hub, we will not be able to assist you with this and you should contact NHS by calling 119.

This Practice is open, as it has been throughout the pandemic, however a restricted service is currently provided to allow us to support the mass vaccination of our community. We continue to offer telephone assessments for all requests to see a GP or Advanced Clinical Practitioner and you will be offered a face-to-face appointment at the surgery, if the clinician feels you need one.

#### What you can do to help?

Please help us by being considerate with your requests, and your expectations, when communicating with our reception and clinical staff. Please consider how urgent or significant your query or request is before contacting the surgery. We want to reassure you that patient care is our absolute priority. You should still contact us if you have an urgent or pressing need and we will still do our best to help you when you need our services. However, many non-urgent matters or queries may be able to wait until this critical period is over, or may be best referred to another solution such as a centrally managed service or a community pharmacy.






Beavers and Cubs made pancakes in February. That's a thumbs up from me.

## Food Hampers - Update to last issue



## Horsley Woodhouse & Denby 2.25 or 4.25 miles



Walk along Main Street and turn left down the Crescent and on to Chestnut Close. Then take the footpath to Carr Farm. Here take the path to Denby. Cross the foot bridge and come out on to Flamstead Lane. Turns left, and at Denby Lane take the path opposite to Lady Lane. Here turn left and after a short distance take the track on the right. Join the footpath at the end and continue on to the Pottery for refreshments.

The shorter route return on the bus and the longer route return on the same path to the top of the hill. Then take the footpath through the many small gates to Pottery Lane. Continue to Denby Lane and turn left and at the school take the footpath through to Flamstead Lane. Turn left and take the footpath on the right. Follow this through to Meadow Close, and continue along Fairfield Road to Main Street. Turn right and head back.
