### 'We Will Remember Them'

### Horsley Woodhouse Servicemen with known graves:

### Private George Booth, 1st Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment, WW1

Records confirm that George Booth served as a Private in the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment in the First World War. His Service No. was 22817.

The Northamptonshire Regiment was formed originally in 1881, as part of the Childers Reforms undertaken by the then Secretary of State for War, Hugh Childers. The reforms were, essentially, a continuation of the earlier Cardwell Reforms aimed at restructuring of the infantry regiments of the British Army. Under the Childers element of the reforms, the former 48<sup>th</sup> (Northamptonshire) Regiment of Foot and the 58<sup>th</sup> (Rutlandshire) Regiment of Foot were amalgamated to form the Northamptonshire Regiment.

Regimental Crest

The Regiment saw action in the North West Frontier Operations of 1897-98 and the Second Boer War (1899-1902) before the outbreak of World War 1, with Britain's involvement commencing on the 4<sup>th</sup> August 1914. On that fateful date, the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion of the Northants were in Blackdown near Aldershot, as part of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Brigade, 1<sup>st</sup> Division. The 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion mobilised for war on the 13<sup>th</sup> of August 1914, proceeding to France and landing at Le Havre. The Battalion were to fight on the Western Front for the duration of the war, taking part in the majority of the main actions, beginning with Mons and the subsequent retreat, The Battles of the Marne and Aisne, the First Battle of Ypres (all 1914) and the winter operations of 1914-15. In 1915 they were involved in the Battle of Aubers and the Battle of Loos. In 1916 they were in action at various times in the Battles of the Somme, including Albert, Bazentin, Pozieres, Flers-Courcelette and Morval. 1917 saw them engaged in action during the German retreat to the Hindenburg Line (February to early April). George Booth is known to have been in England in April 1917 having been "invalided home"; I do not have details of when he joined the Army but, given that the 1<sup>ST</sup> Battalion were in action from the very start, it is probable that he saw a fair amount of the above fighting before being significantly wounded.

Private George Booth died of wounds received on the 9<sup>th</sup> April 1917 he is buried in Horsley Woodhouse village cemetery under a CWGC headstone. I do not have details of the circumstances or nature of his wounds, it is possible that they were sustained during the actions associated with the German retreat to the Hindenburg Line in the earlier part of 1917, but it is also possible that he was wounded at an earlier time before being invalided back to the UK.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment fought on in 1918 in the Battles of the Lys, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battle of Arras, the Battles of the Hindenburg Line (including Ephey, the St Quentin Canal and Beurevoir), the Selle and the Sambre in which the 1<sup>st</sup> Division fought the Passage of the Sambre-Oise Canal.

By the Armistice of the 11<sup>th</sup> November 1918, the Battalion was at Fresnoy-le-Grand, S.W. of Bohain in France. They went on to form part of the Occupation Force at Bonn, Germany.



Overall the Northamptonshire Regiment raised 13No. Battalions and received 58 Battle Honours and 6VC's. The Regiment sustained total losses of 5950 men during the course of the war.

### County Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated

I am continuing to get complaints in respect of residents parking vehicles on the pavement on Main Street, in such a way that pedestrians have to walk into the road to get past. This is particularly dangerous, especially for those using mobility scooters or parents with young children and pushchairs.

Motorists who park vehicles on the pavement, preventing it being used by pedestrians, can be fined and in some cases receive penalty points on their licence. I accept the reasons why people are doing it, but please be a little more considerate, in the gap you leave. Others can at least then use the pavement for what it was designed for, walking on!

On behalf of local residents I have raised the issue with the local Police Inspector and requested that appropriate action is taken to address this problem.

The Planning Inspector is re-convening the hearing to look into Amber Valley's Core Strategy (Local Plan) on 15<sup>th</sup> December. Amber Valley is required to facilitate sufficient strategic sites to allow the potential building of 9,770 dwellings between 2011 and 2028. This is significantly more than Amber Valley needs, as they are required to include 2,371 dwellings as part of Derby City's unmet need.

There is also a requirement to provide a 5 year housing supply of 1,010 dwellings per annum. This will be a particular challenge, as Developers build houses, not Amber Valley Borough Council. It must be noted that Developers only built a total of 1,000 homes in the whole of the last 5 years. Whatever the outcome of the Core Strategy, houses will still be built. They may just end up being built in places we all prefer them not to be.

A Combined Authority is still high on the agenda, although it will now be referred to as the East Midland Devolution Deal, as it includes all Councils that make up Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. In essence, it is an opportunity for powers and resources currently held by Government, being transferred to allow local control.

There will be an elected Mayor, to cover Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire, who you will have the opportunity to vote for. The financial benefits and powers have yet to be fully determined, but you will hear phrases such as control over the Transport Fund (£157m a year). A Single Investment pot, possibly in the region of £30m per year for 30 years (new money). This sounds a lot, but needs putting into perspective, as it will cover 19 different councils. The current annual budget for Derbyshire County Council is in the region of £1.2 billion.

The bigger prize for me is potential access to National and European Funding for existing strategic projects. This is aimed at creating economic growth, jobs, skills, transport, infrastructure etc. The East Midland Evolution Deal has yet to be agreed. Legislation will have to be passed and there will be public consultation to give you the chance to make comment. I therefore do not anticipate it being ratified until possibly September 2016, with elections for the Mayor being held in May 2017.

  grave stones in the adjacent cemetery.
- Permission has been granted for the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Carnival to be held on the Sitwell Recreation Ground next year on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2015.

### Philippine Community Fund – request for ring-pulls please!

The overall aim is to stop children from being sent out to scavenge for metals on the rubbish dumps in order for their families to make a living, allowing their children to go to school where they can receive an education and two meals a day. <u>ringpull.org</u> arranges the collection and sending of ring-pulls to the parents of these children. The fathers file down the sharp edges whilst the mothers crotchet the ring-

pulls into handbags, belts, bracelets, necklaces etc., which allows them to earn significantly more through the sale of ring-pull products than they can on the rubbish sites.

We would like to ask people to save up their ring-pulls, either from work or at home in order to send off to the charity. It's seems such a tiny effort to save the ring-pulls but can have such a huge impact on people's lives. A collection box will be put in the hut and we will send them off from time to time Why not put a bag load in our letter box?

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
