The Food Bank is open to people within <u>Horsley Woodhouse</u> to access, so please do get in touch. We are open on a Friday from 10.00 am - 12.00 pm for us to deliver out and for folk to come and collect.

The food bank is run by folk within the church with people from the locale who give their time to help stock the shelves, pack the bags and deliver or give out food parcels. **The Food Bank is open each Wednesday from 10.00 am - 2.00 pm, to take deliveries,** including from supermarkets; Morrison's at Ilkeston have supplied and continue to supply many items free of charge on a weekly basis. We also find that people, just like the good folk of Horsley Woodhouse, provide donations from the goodness of their hearts.

We literally turn up on a morning sometimes and there will be a few tins of soup in a bag on the door step or there may be someone reverse their car up to our doors with literally a car full of food. They don't want any recognition or publicity but give because others are in need. We had a young mum get in touch a couple of months ago, who, with a group of friends have organised Christmas presents for children of clients of the food bank. They have bought, wrapped and supplied these gifts totally free of charge and again don't wish for any recognition or publicity for this incredibly kind act.

As a church they also run a CAP (Christians Against Poverty) debt centre and support many of those folk who are working their way out of debt. To date they have helped 11 people become debt free through the centre.



In Memory

Nona Mary Travers 12th October 1918 to 27th December 2020

Nona was born to Isobel and Frederick Starbuck on Home Farm Medbourne overlooking Leicestershire's Welland Valley. She was the elder of two sisters and was brought up with Dulcie on the mixed family farm helping her parents tend to the hens, sheep, cattle and heavy horses, and to the growing of their cereal, root and fodder crops. Nona attended the village primary school



before moving onto Market Harborough Grammar School, which necessitated a 14-mile round trip, five of them on foot. She belonged to St Giles Church in Medbourne and also went to the occasional services at Nevill Holt Church where her father was churchwarden.

After leaving school Nona was successful in obtaining a place at Great Ormond Street Hospital in London where she trained as a children's nurse. During the early war years she was relocated to Haywards Heath in Sussex where on one memorable night she and her fellow nurses were strafed by a German fighter plane whilst cycling back to their hostel. They all lived to tell the tale but the wearing of uniforms in public was forbidden from that day.

In 1942 Nona married Bernard Shaw, a company secretary and accomplished rugby player, with whom she had two boys, Anthony and Andrew. Initially they lived in Leicester but then moved back to Medbourne where Bernard took up farming in partnership with his father-in-law. When the farm was sold in the late 1950s the family moved to Oadby, a suburb of Leicester, and over the succeeding ten years Nona worked at the Leicester Royal Infirmary and also as a school nurse, or 'Nit Nurse' as they were often known! Sadly Bernard died in 1965 but with both boys now having left home Nona began a new life, marrying Alan Travers, a computer service engineer, and moving to his home town of Wokingham in Berkshire.

Nona thoroughly enjoyed her life in Berkshire spending happy times with her new family and as ever soon making many new friends. She took up golf for the first time and continued playing at a good club level for another 30 years. She kept miniature smooth-haired dachshunds, walking them in Windsor Great Park and continued nursing, this time helping older people in the community. Nona was also involved in voluntary work with both Macmillan Cancer Support and Arthritis Care receiving an award for her work with the latter charity. Annual holidays in the Greek Islands also became an important feature of life with Kalymnos, Halki and especially Symi being favoured spots.

Happy times ended when Alan became ill and in 1996 they moved to Horsley Woodhouse to be nearer to Andrew and to other family members living in Leicestershire. Sadly, Alan's death soon followed but Nona, supported by family, neighbours and new friends, especially at St John's Church Smalley, embarked on the final period of her life. She continued her voluntary work, this time at the Cathedral Shop, became involved in church and charitable activities including the Mothers Union, read widely, knitted lengthily and travelled afar with both family and friends, Saga cruises being her favoured ventures. Now with four grandsons and eventually eleven great grandchildren, family was hugely important in her life. Independent and determined to the last, Nona continued driving until her 100th birthday and had her last holiday abroad, flying to Southern Spain, just a year before her death at the Heanor Park Care Home on 27th December having just enjoyed her 103rd Christmas.

Councillor Kevin Buttery - Keeping you Updated

Despite receiving a 'qualified statement' relating to 'Value for Money' from the independent auditor, Amber Valley Borough Council has agreed to sell land worth £149,000 to Ripley Town Council for £1. I have 'called-in' this decision as I certainly consider that it needs more scrutiny and the claimed saving figures just don't add up!

I am pleased that Heanor has qualified to receive £8.5 million from the Government's proactive and containment investment of £830million into the Future High Street Fund. I have been extremely supportive of this application which started over two years ago and with this announcement, can see the High Street changing for the better. This Government funding will breathe life back into Heanor town centre and could not have come at a more welcome time. We all need to work together in an effort to aid economic recovery after a very difficult and challenging year. This is definitely the sort of investment we need for the High Street and is a fantastic opportunity to provide real jobs and potential for growth, that will benefit all Heanor

residents.

Covid-19 remains a dominant factor in our way of life, with a myriad of advice available on Council, Government and NHS websites, should you need it. Infection rates remain high in Amber Valley, so we do need to follow guidelines to keep everyone as safe as possible. Testing and vaccinations are being administered locally. **Derbyshire County Council has** received £6.5million to support measures. The £2.2m Covid Winter Grant Scheme targeting vulnerable families with children, covers the period up to the 31st March 2021.

Amber Valley Borough Council is continuing to administer the various Government Grants to businesses impacted by the pandemic. If you have already applied for funding as a result of the Tier 3 restrictions, for the period 2nd December to 31st December 2020 and have been successful, you should receive payment shortly.

Those eligible for the latest **Tier 4 lockdown restriction** payments need to apply separately, so please do not use the Tier 3 Forms to do so. My advice is to keep a check

on the Council's website for the latest guidelines and criteria. If in any doubt, just apply, as I would not want anyone to miss out.

The website www.mentalhealthandmoneyadvi ce.org also provides information and guidance relating to personal financial circumstances such as furlough and job loss, benefit advice, mental health and wellbeing etc.

The A38 Junction improvement scheme, promoted by Highways England, that will see a flyover built at the Little Eaton roundabout, has finally been approved by the Secretary of State. I anticipate this could start in Spring of this year and take two years to complete, so expect some traffic disruption during the construction stage. However, once completed it should reduce peak hour congestion as well as improve journey times and the flow of traffic through Amber Valley. This will help improve bus service reliability, as they often get snarled up in the traffic jams.

John Bosworth

22nd February 1926 to 27th December 2020

It's with a heavy heart that we announce the passing of John Bosworth of Smalley, who died peacefully on the 27th December at the age of 94.

John and his family regularly bring his steam engine to take part in Horsley Woodhouse Carnival, and some may remember his Butchers shop in Smalley.



John was born in 1926 and was raised at White House Farm in West Hallam village. He went on to run the family's butchers shop at the farm until 1960 when he and his wife Olive moved to Smalley to take on the Butchers Shop on Main Road, nearly opposite the Bell Inn. John was a butcher/Master Butcher all his life until retirement in 1991, except for a short two-year break when he served with the RAF in India & Burma during final years of World War Two.

He always held a fascination with machinery probably after seeing the traction engine and threshing gang coming to the family's farm at West Hallam. As a result of this interest, he acquired many pieces of vintage machinery, including a Threshing drum, a Field Marshall tractor, Marshall steam roller "Goolie" as well as his pride and joy, Foster traction engine

'Sprig'. All were thoroughly restored with help of family and friends and rallied extensively locally and further afield.





It is through John's interest in steam that his son, grandchildren, brother, nephew, and many friends have all been able to follow in this hobby.

He held various roles within clubs and societies including the Round Table, Belper Butchers Association, National Traction Engine Club and Steam

Apprentice Club. He always encouraged youngsters and was keen to get them involved in activities of the clubs particularly during his time as Chairman of the Steam Apprentice Club.

John also admired the work of the RNLI and the bravery of the lifeboat men and was for a time a president of the landlocked Long Eaton fund raising branch of the RNLI. He also supported them by raising funds over the years through

a RNLI donation box attached to the front of his Foster traction engine.

The last nine months were difficult as he suffered from ill health, but he was able to stay with his son David and daughter-in-law Catherine during the lockdowns, allowing him to be together with Olive, his wife of 70 years, who was able to sit by his side throughout.

John's final journey was behind his Traction Engine on Thursday 21st January.

Originally from London, as a child Dennis and his brother were sent to a farm in Frome, Somerset as war evacuees. They were well looked after and their parents were lucky, in that they could visit the boys, as many couldn't. Dennis's father was an engineer and during WW2 was moved to the Rolls Royce site at Derby, to support the war effort. Dennis and his



family relocated to Little Eaton. It wasn't until he met his wife Janet that he set up home in the late 1950's in Carr Fields, Horsley Woodhouse; where he remained until his sad departure.

Janet and Dennis were married for 50 years and had three children Nigel, Lee and Rachel. As the only remaining child Dennis leaves behind Rachel and her husband, three grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Dennis finished his working life as a maintenance engineer at Denby Pottery before his retirement.

Dennis enjoyed life to the full and was an active member of the Over 60's Group committee, where he also enjoyed the trips and activities over the years. He supported the Carnival committee for many years; only stepping down in his early 80's but he still continued to help on the day. He was always wanting to support the Carnival any way he could and donated a trophy for 'Best Float' in memory of his late wife Janet.

Arthur Medical Centre

Arthur Medical Centre is committed to the successful delivery of the Covid-19 vaccination programme. This work is vital to the country's efforts to counter the pandemic and save lives. The Government and the NHS have given priority status to this work and GP surgeries have been asked to suspend non-essential services, to enable them to support this national effort.

The Government has also announced that the UK Covid alert level has been raised to level 5. This means that NHS services are subject to significant, potentially overwhelming demand and that all non-essential work should be stopped to allow General Practice to cope with the demand of the vaccination programme. Subsequently, queries regarding routine, non-essential services may be referred to a centrally managed service, or you may be asked to wait until normal services are resumed.

This Practice is open; however, a restricted service is currently provided to allow us to focus on priority work and to allow us to support the mass vaccination of our community. Please find below details of updates or changes to services:

GP Telephone appointments and contact attempts

We have a policy for telephone appointments, where GPs will make a maximum of two attempts to contact patients for scheduled telephone appointments. If the GP is not able to reach you within two attempts, your appointment will be cancelled and you will need to book another appointment.

Contraception

- All routine contraception will now be referred to Your Sexual Health Matters (Derbyshire & Derby Sexual Health Services)
- Requests for emergency contraception will be referred to the pharmacy
- Patients who have an acute or urgent problem relating to contraception, such as bleeding, can still be seen by a GP

Ring Pessaries

- All ring pessary services will be stopped
- Patients who have an acute problem with a ring pessary, such as pain or bleeding, can still speak to a clinician

Minor Surgery/Joint Injections

All minor surgery and joint injection services are stopped


Scouts, Cubs, Beavers & Explorers





Fairview Close – Play Area

Following a review of play areas across the whole area of Kilburn, a decision had been made that the equipment which was provided by Amber Valley Council within the Fairview Play Area was deemed unsafe. The equipment has now been removed. The Parish Council have written to Amber Valley to request to take ownership of the land and change it into a community garden. If successful the Parish Council would request local residents to get in

The Community Garden would be available to all residents and will be a great addition to the village. Should there ever be any other play areas which fall into this category we would look to try and replicate across the village for a community feel.


Kilburn Nature Reserve

The Parish Council have been working tirelessly over the last year to seek approval for funding to reinvigorate the Nature Reserve. Many parishioners currently use the Nature Reserve and Memorial Garden, but we would like to see that improved with better access for disabled people, removing some of the trees to allow more light, and also to let existing trees flourish which are being stifled by the number. Improving fencing and adding additional support around the brook to enable pond dipping, school classes and people to fully enjoy the area.

Horsley Woodhouse Walks

Two local walks have been provided for Horsley Woodhouse residents to try. They are only a guide and all routes are on public rights of way, accessible land or footpaths/highways. Please consider others and follow Covid-19 restrictions and social distancing guidelines. Please follow the countryside code and dress appropriately e.g. waterproof footwear and clothing. The fields around the village may contain animals and will be muddy at this time of year. No responsibility can be taken for any access routes or public rights of way that may have changed or may not be accessible.




Walk down Main Street to St Susanna's Church. Turn left up the road to the playing fields.

Continue along the footpaths to Stainsby Avenue and turn left down the road to Hirst Farm. Join the path at the back of the farm house and continue to the Crab House. Now follow the road towards Carr Farm and just before the farm join the footpath back to the village. On the crescent take the path behind Spring Cottage, and head slowly back.

Walk time approximately 1 hour 10 minutes

Turn right on leaving the Church Hall car park. Cross the road at the church. Then take the lane to the recreation ground. Here join the footpath out to Stainsby Avenue. Cross the track and continue along to join the bridleway. Turn right, cross the recreation ground and the road, and taken the footpath out to the cricket ground. Here turn right and continue to Wood Lane.

Turn right again carry on along Wood Lane, and take the footpath on the left. Follow this through to the bottom of Golden Valley.

For the short walk take the footpath on the right up to the Main Road. Here turn right and head back to the Church Hall.

The longer walk continues up Golden Valley. At the top cross the road and turn right, and after a short distance take the track on the left. Follow this round to the crescent, turn left and join the footpath at the end of Chestnut Close. At Hurst Farm take the track on the right to the Crab House. From here follow the footpath on the right through to Meadow Close. Turn left at Fairfield Road and head back to the Church Hall.
